# Ferry Birds –January to May 2004

The bird walk on the 5<sup>th</sup> May was, I think, a success despite the cold easterly wind off the sea. Because of this the birds were hiding away and it meant that we had to rely on our ears as much as our eyes. We started by looking at the Bay and saw nothing. The waders, except for a single **curlew** and a few oystercatchers, are all away to their breeding haunts. The black-headed gulls and common gulls have also disappeared leaving the herring gulls to feed in the mud, more particularly in the Bay behind The Albert when the tide is out. I was watching them feeding recently. The only things I saw being caught were small crabs which the gulls dealt with by vigorous shaking to remove the legs. The remnants were then swallowed. It is a one-sided battle once the crab has been spotted not quite hidden in the mud. I also saw several hundred gulls, mainly herring and lesser-black backed, feeding on the sea between Port Laing and Cruickness Point the last week in April. They seemed to be picking eel-like fish from just below the surface of the water. Once a fish had been caught a melee ensued with the other gulls in the vicinity trying to make the catcher drop its prize. There seemed to be plenty of these fish around and the air resounded to the calls of the gulls which only attracted more of them to the scene. I spoke to friend who has a fishing boat at Granton and he said that he had seen unusual numbers of butterfish in the Forth and that they were long, thin and dark and would look eel-like from a distance. I would be pleased to hear from anyone who knows about these fish and if it was likely that they were what the gulls were feeding on.

Continuing our walk we went along the coastal path towards Port Laing. We heard **chaffinches**, **willow**

warblers and linnets, but were disappointed to find that the **fulmars** on the quarry face had disappeared. However one did do a fly-past as we walked along. At Port Laing we saw a great-black-backed gull amongst a group of herring gulls and then spotted an oystercatcher and what I said was a curlew. I was probably wrong about the curlew and one of the party did say that it had a short bill for a **curlew**. The next day I went back to Port Laing and found a bird which, with the better light, was obviously not a curlew but a whimbrel. Assuming that this was the same bird, John Clemmens was right to question my original identification. My consolation was that it was the first whimbrel I had seen this year. Beyond Cruickness Point we had a good view of a **kestrel** hovering over the quarry and saw several shelducks in Inverkeithing Inner Bay. The walk was a good example of how listening for the bird calls is so important for their identification.

Although most of the winter visitors have now left North Queensferry there were a few stragglers this One of the noticeable ones was a redvear. throated diver which was seen frequently close to the shore at Port Laing. There were 1 or 2 others further out at the same time, but I think the one close to shore was injured in some way. It seemed to be holding it's foot at an awkward angle out of the water. I've not seen it recently, so I hope that it has managed to fly back to its breeding grounds, probably in the North-West of Scotland. Up to 4 great-crested grebes have also been on the sea between Port Laing and Cruickness up to the middle of May. These birds breed on fresh water locally so I'm not sure why they are still here on the sea. I also saw a single female goldeneye off Cruickness Point on the 25<sup>th</sup> of April.

## Can You Help?

Christina (Christian) Bell (maiden name Proud) and James Bell were married in 1851. They had two daughters Mary and Martha (my great grandmother) and approx 6 sons including Alexander, John and Robert. Most of the children were born in Beath but they also lived in Inverkeithing and North Queensferry. In the 1881 census they lived in North Queensferry at Orchard Head Cottage.

Is there still an Orchard Head Cottage? What was the name of all the brothers and where did they end up? Although Martha and her husband Charles McNeil are buried at Inverkeithing next to her daughter, my great aunt Christina (Tina) and her husband Charlie Donaldson, I can't find anyone else? I would love to know where Christina and James Bell are buried. Any info would be much appreciated.

Many of our summer visitors are now present in and around the village. I have heard and seen several different warblers along the coastal path and by St Margaret's Marsh. There seem to be plenty of blackcaps and willow warblers along the path and the usual chiffchaffs at Port Laing. The latter is usually the first warbler to appear each spring. This year I heard the first one on the 26<sup>th</sup> of March. The rarest is the lesser whitethroat which I first heard on the 30<sup>th</sup> April and then saw on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of May in the Carlingnose Reserve. St Margaret's Marsh is a very good for sedge warblers although the first one I saw in the area was again from the coastal path near Port Laing. I have also seen a few swallows usually flying overhead and often near Cruickness Point.

The **Sandwich terns** have been back in good numbers since the middle of April, but the **common terns** which often nest on Long Craig were much later in arriving. The first time I saw more than 1 or 2 was on the 12<sup>th</sup> of May when there were several checking out Long Craig and several others feeding out in the Estuary.

Meanwhile the breeding cycle for our resident birds will now be in full swing. **Blackbirds** and **song thrushes** will now probably have young to feed so they will not have time to be singing so much and the **robins**, **dunnocks** and **wrens** will also soon become less conspicuous as they realise that the welfare of their young is more important than showing off to their next door neighbours. Let's hope all our birds have a successful breeding season and fill our gardens and hedgerows with young birds.

There are 4 relatively common birds of prey around the village. Perhaps the best known and certainly

### **Neighbourhood Watch**

The Neighbourhood Watch soldiers on. The trouble is that there isn't that much trouble in the Village. Security is always a case of being sensible and anticipating what might happen. If you are at the bottom of the garden cutting the grass are you sure your front door is secure? If you are in the house having that well-earned cup of tea having cut the grass is the mower far away at the bottom of the garden unattended? Did you lock the garden shed when you put the mower away? Just remember and you won't be sorry.

We are still looking for someone to join the Committee with the intention of carrying on the running of the Neighbourhood Watch. Any volunteers please contact one of the Committee. It is not an onerous task, but we need some new blood to revitalise the Scheme.

Finally, we can only try and improve security if we know what needs doing. It is the member's Neighbourhood Watch not just the Committee's. If

the commonest until a few years ago is the **kestrel**. Its familiarity was probably due to its habit of using roadside verges as its hunting grounds and as a consequence it became the most recognisable bird of prey in the country. The kestrel is the only bird of prey which persistently hovers as it searches for its prey. It is the only one which can do this on calm days. Small rodents are the main prey for kestrels. Buzzards which are much bigger than kestrels do occasionally hang in the wind searching, but can only do this if the wind is strong enough and will always be facing into the wind. Buzzards normally hunt by soaring high over the ground, circling around using their keen eyesight to spot their rabbit prey. In recent year buzzards have become much more common and are often seen on fence posts along our main roads. Sparrowhawks also soar to spy out the land and then come down to the woodland and hedges to chase their prey. They are agile flyers and try to surprise their prey by flying along a hedge and then flying over it and along the other side. Because the male **sparrowhawk** is much smaller than the female they take smaller birds whilst the female can take prey as large as a woodpigeon. Peregrines are the local star performers as birds of prey. They can fly at up to 150 miles per hour by closing their wings and literally falling through the air. Their main prey around North Queensferry will probably be the **feral pigeons** on the Rail Bridge. The kestrels and buzzards are the easier to see and recognise. Their way of hunting makes that the case. The sparrowhawks and peregrines are often gone before you have chance to recognise them, but they are around to be seen, if you keep your eyes open. There's nothing like practice, so get out there and get spotting.

#### Current Issues

The main issue affecting North Queensferry at present is the increase in the number of calls being received from the local com-

munity involving the anti-social behaviour of youths. The local police have received a number of complaints recently which range from disorderly conduct to youths congregating and consuming alcohol at various locations. The local police will continue to address such problems in a proactive manner.

Over the past few weeks, the local primary school has become the focal point of such behaviour and this has resulted in damage being caused to the school on several occasions. In view of this, the school has been designated the 'Hot Spot' for the local police and will be subject to numerous checks and a high profile police presence in the area.

If any local residents experience any form of anti-social behaviour, I would ask them to contact the local police as any incidents arise.

Local residents have also reported problems with indiscriminate and dangerous parking of motor vehicles at various locations within the village. The local Community Police and Traffic Wardens will continue to monitor and regulate such problems, however, if any specific parking issues arise, please report such instances to the local police.

#### **Ongoing Initiatives**

Vandalism – We have implemented an initiative to tackle vandalism in the local area. The initiative is operating on a number of levels including education and police enforcement. The local primary school recently won a prize for the work undertaken by the pupils as part of a project highlighting the various issues surrounding vandalism.

The Police enforcement phase of the initiative has also commenced with a series of articles in the Dunfermline Press highlighting the problems associated with vandalism across the Division. In addition, a dedicated enquiry unit has been set up whose sole remit during the initiative will be the investigation and detection of vandalism. If you have any information regarding vandalism, please contact the local police.

Anti-Social Behaviour - The officers of Dalgety Bay Community Team have produced an Action Plan which will run for the entire month of May. As stated earlier, there has been an increase in the number of complaints from local residents across Dalgety Bay policing area regarding youth disorder and the associated anti-social behaviour from youths congregating and drinking alcohol at various locations in all the towns and villages in our policing area. The locations are primarily being used as gathering points and drinking dens by groups of up to 50

youths, particularly on Friday evenings, and are subject to littering, acts of vandalism and use as a public toilet by these groups. In view of this members of the Dalgety Bay Community Team assisted by the valuable members of our local Special Constabulary will undertake both plain clothes and uniformed foot and mobile patrols at these locations to address this anti-social behaviour and to detect any offences committed.

If there are any areas in your local community which you would wish the police to target, then please let me know.

### Second Chance Association Dog Training School



The Dog training classes are held to teach the dog owning public how to take care of and control their dogs. This also aids them to become responsible members of society The classes are held 7-9pm each Monday evening throughout the year (with a break for

Christmas and The New Year).

All profit from the classes is currently paid to the Second Chance Association (registered charity no Sc032203) to help them maintain their kennels at Thornton. These kennels are kept to enable rescue, restoration to health and rehoming of unwanted dogs.

The numbers attending the classes varies but on average the attendance is ten per night.

The dog training undertaken is based on the Kennel Club Good Citizen Dog Scheme (GCDS) and the Kennel Club Bronze, Silver and Gold tests are held throughout the year at the North Queensferry Hall with a high success rate.

The school is also involved in raising money through Sponsored Walks and Dog Shows.

The school held at North Queensferry captures dog owners from North Queensferry, Rosyth, Inverkeithing and surrounding districts but has also attracted attendees from as far north as Kinross. The school is planning to become involved with the Dog Aid Society Scotland (DASS) in the near future and this will enable us to become involved with and aware of dog owners throughout Scotland.



# Village Show: Saturday August 28<sup>th</sup> 2004 2pm – 4pm Community Centre.


