### Ferry Birds - January to May 2006

The wintering birds around the village and coast have now nearly all left for their breeding grounds further north in Scotland or elsewhere. The goldeneye and redbreasted mergansers both winter on the sea and have mainly left although there was a single female goldeneye in Inverkeithing Bay off Cruickness on the 18th of April and about 6 mergansers practising their synchronised diving off the Railway Pier on the 25th. Other winter visitors were around until April. Up to 6 little grebes were spread along the coast between North Queensferry and Inverkeithing throughout the winter and a few greatcrested grebes were seen as well. As is usual there were 3 or 4 red-throated divers to be seen in the autumn and early winter which seemed to disappear later on with just one seen occasionally thereafter in February and March. The dunlin which have wintered in recent years in considerable numbers were conspicuous by their absence. The only dunlin I saw was one in West Bay on the 21st of February and a small group of less than 10 also in the Bay in March.

This year the arrival of some of our summer visitors was, on the whole, later than last year. The first chiffchaff I heard at Port Laing was on the 12th of April which was a fortnight later than last year. March of course was colder in Scotland than December, January or February so this late arrival was perhaps not that surprising. warblers such as blackcaps, lesser whitethroats and willow warblers have also been heard and seen. Small numbers of blackcaps now spend the winter in the UK so the female seen from the coastal path near the Rail Bridge on 28th of March may have been a wintering bird, but the one at Jamestown on the 19th of April was probably a recent arrival from Africa. The lesser whitethroat at Carlingnose on the 5th of May was about a week later than last year, but hopefully it will stay and breed. I have seen more lesser whitethroats this year than ever with 2 along the coastal path near Kinghorn and one at Aberlady Bay in East Lothian at the beginning of May. Willow warblers are Scotland's most numerous warbler. They breed in many different habitats wherever there are trees so that at this time of year they can be heard singing throughout the countryside. The terns also arrived later than last year although the common terns appeared suddenly in large numbers on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of April and were seen feeding just off Carlingnose and I counted more than 100 near the Railway Pier at the beginning of May. The terns had started flying around and landing on Long Craig by the 12th of May. They have nested here over the last few years even though their nests are regularly threatened by a combination of high tides and strong winds. Scottish Wildlife Trust has placed tyres on the ruined pier below Carlingnose to try and persuade them to use the pier for nesting, but they have so far not realised the potential benefit of moving home. The first Sandwich tern I positively identified was on the 11th of May although there was probably one with the common terns on the 23rd of April. A small group of **swallows** was seen by the coastal path on the 9th of April and I saw my first one at Carlingnose view point 2 days later. Earlier this month there were 4 swallows flying around in the lower part of the village and I'm hoping they will nest again this year. Another sighting of birds returning to our coast to breed was of **fulmars** on Inchgarvie in January. They did there usual trick of coming back to check out their nesting

ledges about the 12th staying until the 27<sup>th</sup> and then returning on the 6<sup>th</sup> of February. The overspill from Inchgarvie was prospecting the quarry face at Carlingnose later on in March.

I have had several sightings of more unusual birds in and around the village. I had siskins on my garden feeder on the 20th of February and a raven at Jamestown on the 19th of April was the first I have seen in the area. I saw a peregrine on the Rail Bridge on the 23rd and 24th of February and there were two common sandpipers in Inverkeithing Inner Bay on the 18th of April. These small waders are summer visitors to Scotland breeding by running water throughout upland Scotland and along the coast in the West. It is not surprising therefore to see them on the coast during their migration. Finally during a feeding frenzy off Port Laing on the 25th of April there were several groups of razorbills amongst the 2 or 3 hundred herring gulls and a lone black guillemot... This is only the second **black guillemot** I have seen from North Queensferry. The **herring gulls** were feeding on small eel-like fish which were grabbed from the surface by one of the gulls which was immediately mobbed by the adjacent gulls in an occasionally successful attempt to rob the original bird of it's catch.

Spring and early summer are, in my opinion, the best time of the year. Two things in particular make it so. The first is the start of the growing season. Most of our plants die back or shed their leaves in the autumn so that they can survive the dark and sometimes cold winter. Evergreen plants slow down their metabolism as well. Annual plants create seeds or underground tubers which again have evolved to withstand the winter weather. Spring and early summer is the time when things start happening and the evidence is all about us now at the beginning of May. The fresh foliage and flowers are confirmation that the annual cycle is in full flow.

The second event is connected to the first. The new foliage is available as food for the caterpillars and other insects which have also survived the winter as eggs. pupae or adults. The young hatch from the eggs and start feeding. The pupae become adults which feed on the nectar from the flowers and those that over-winter as adults also gain strength from the nectar and pollen. These adults then mate and lay eggs that hatch to give more plant-eating young. The abundance of insect life thus created is then the lure for many of the migrant birds such as swallows, swifts and the several kinds of warbler which return to Scotland from their wintering grounds in Africa to breed. The insect eating resident birds such as wrens of course also have to survive the winter and do so by finding some of the insect eggs or pupae produced by last year's adult insects. Other birds such as **chaffinches** and **house sparrows** feed mainly on natural seeds and bird food provided by us human beings.

This is part of the natural cycle that has been going on for millions of years, so remember this when you get annoyed by a swarm of insects or some caterpillars start devouring your garden plants. Encourage the birds and you might get respite from the plague and also see some attractive birds as well.

#### Greetings from North Queensferry Church.

Work completed includes a new roof, a refitted kitchen and the installation of a disabled toilet and access ramp. The next project we are about to undertake is to fit new, much needed double glazed windows to the church and internal redecoration. The church is, of course, primarily about people and I'm glad to say there is much going on that is very encouraging. I'd like to mention especially the work of our Boys Brigade company. The quality of the work going on quietly week by week is reflected in the good news that two of the senior members, Dougie Thoms and Paul Johnston, have just won the Queens Award, the highest BB award there is. To launch Christian Aid week, the Company helped to lead a service with an African theme, including an account of a visit Gillian, one of our adult helpers, made to Kenya. The boys also helpfully distributed the Christian Aid gift envelopes round the village, which last year raised around £1,000 for a range of projects in many parts of the world.

Regular Sunday worship and fellowship, including Children's Church, continue to be the heartbeat of the congregation's life. In recent months, our love of singing received a boost with the arrival of the new church hymn book which has a greater variety of musical styles than ever before. Our aim is to be a church in the community, for the community, and we extend a warm welcome to any who wish to come along to celebrate or explore the Christian faith which has for centuries played a significant part in the life of the village.

#### **Community Council**

When I moved to North Queensferry eight years ago from Edinburgh, I was hugely impressed by what a real sense of community there is here. This is a place which is not some kind of dormitory for other places, somewhere just to sleep and then move on, but, rather a place which is rooted in history, which is nourished by its setting, and, above all, which is defined by its people.

If you live here you want to contribute something to the village, to do what you can to make it better. Of course, sometimes different people have different visions of what that means, and there can be lively and vigorous debate over such things, yet, always underneath there is a feeling that what we share and have in common is so much more meaningful than what may seem to divide us.

This whole ethos of commitment to community combined with vigorous debate has a focus (but by no means its only focus) in the Community Council. Since I have been priviledged to have joined it, I have been struck how, with virtually no financial resources, it is able to do so much for the community, whether promoting floral enchancement, the wells project, commenting on planning applications, helping find new uses for the railway station building, and even seeking a coat of arms for the village!

These are all things which have been on the agenda since the last issue of the Ferry News, though perhaps the greatest cause for concern for residents has been rising anxieties over levels of crime in the village, culminating in the organising by the Community Council of a special meeting with the police at which these concerns are to be shared.

In many of our activities we work with other organisations, notably Fife Council, and though our relations with the Council are reasonably good, there is the occasional sense of frustration at being the Junior party in the relationship with (hopefully) some measure of influence, but no real power. But then the frustration passes: it's not about having power; its about working with and for the village.

You can see for yourself something of what I mean, and you can even take part in the discussions by coming along on the second Thursday of the month at the Community Centre at 7.30pm.

#### **Community Project**

## Researching the history of North Queensferry over the past 250 years

Over the next few years it is expected that North Queensferry will be designated as a World Heritage site. The Forth Rail Bridge and surrounding community areas, both north and south of the bridge, are already placed on the official Unesco tentative list.

The number of visitors to this area is bound to increase as will the request for up to date and historic information. NQHT is probably the organisation best qualified to undertake the necessary research.

It is, therefore, very important that a number of enthusiastic volunteers, no previous experience required, is recruited to see the project through to its conclusion. Expert guidance is available to oversee research in order to compile a comprehensive record. Local libraries, museums, churches, housing records etc together with other government archive sources are all a source of relevant information. There are likely to be specific categories of interest such as railways, military defences, and local businesses.

Our aim must be to research the important aspects of North Queensferry's historic past and to produce a Community survey. From this survey an authoritative book may be written and published. This would highlight the historic importance the village has played in Scotland's story.

Funding will be required to properly undertake this project and work would be unable to start until this is in place. This would be required for volunteers'

expenses, research fees and a professional fee for an experienced author and other publication costs.
