Ferry Birds - May - Sept 2006

The breeding birds around the coast and village seem to have done pretty well this year. **Swallows** bred in the lower part of the village and I saw young being fed by the adult birds in June. Probably more successful was the pair which nested under the eaves of the station building. The adults were feeding young in the nest and perched on the roof the first week in September and there were at least 11 **swallows** on the electricity wires by the school on the 11th of September. This probably meant at least two broods were raised successfully. In good years **swallows** can raise 3 broods of 4 to 5 young which means an awful lot of insect catching for the adults. All this work just before they set off to South Africa a journey of up to 7000 miles. It's amazing for a bird weighing less than an ounce and fuelled by thousands if not tens of thousands of small insects to travel this distance. Those that survive then return and often come back to the same place next spring.

The other obvious breeding birds are the **aiders** and **common terns** which both seem to have had a successful season. Small young **aiders** started appearing in West Bay in June and I saw several groups of up to 30 young being shepherded along by 3 or 4 females. I even saw a male helping out one occasion. A male **aider** taking parental

responsibility is quite unusual. The **common terns** breed on Long Craig and I am fairly sure that a few pairs of **Sandwich terns** also bred. Young **terns** are not very obvious when they are first hatched. They stay close to the nest and wait, often not that patiently, for one of the adults to come in with a sand eel snack. They breed amongst the rocks on Long Craig and are sometimes quite difficult to see. Later when they have fledged they become more obvious as they follow their parents around again hoping to be fed. The noise of the young entreating their parents to go fishing can be very pervasive during July and August, but this year most of the activity was on Long Craig and the adjacent rocky islets rather than on the mud in West Bay. To emphasise how important Long Craig is for the **terns** I estimated there were up to 500 birds on the island at low tide during August.

I hope the more familiar resident birds have also had a good breeding season. It is difficult to be sure since they seem to disappear from view in early summer. This is because they renew their feathers at this time and become vulnerable to predators. They therefore become quiet and wary. **Robins** are a good example. In June and July you would imagine they have all left for pastures new only to hear them again in August in full flow. **Song thrushes** also seem to disappear, but from the numbers I heard singing in April and May I am sure there are still lots around.

As I have said here before the peak of the breeding season for many birds is often well before we humans are taking, or at least thinking about, our well-earned summer holidays. This summer was no exception with the **redshanks** disappearing from West Bay at the beginning of May to go north and

west to their breeding grounds. On cue a few were back in the middle of June. I saw 1 back on the 22nd of June and by the end of July there were over 30 feeding at low tide in West Bay. There were several **turnstones** on Long Craig as well on the 15th of June, but my feeling is that a few summer along our coasts each year. **Turnstones** are Arctic breeders with a few pairs nesting along the coast in Northern Scotland each year. The **curlews** also disappear, but often there are one or two which remain in the bay. **Oystercatchers** probably breed locally and can be seen throughout the summer.

Migrating birds I saw later in the summer included a **whimbrel** in Inverkeithing Inner Bay on the 22nd of August, a **common sandpiper** in West Bay on the 19th of July and a **wheatear** on the coast near the Road Bridge on the 31st of August. **Common sandpipers** and **wheatears** are widespread breeders in Scotland while **whimbrels** are confined to the Northern Isles and the far north of the mainland. They all however winter in Africa and some pass through, stopping off to feed and recuperate before continuing their journeys south. Places like Inverkeithing Inner Bay and West Bay which are full of mud loving crustaceans and other invertebrates are vital feeding stations for these and many other migrant species.

At the beginning of August I walked along the coastal path from Jamestown back to North Queensferry. I realised something was happening because of the commotion on the sea at three different places. Many **terns**, **razorbills** and **black-headed gulls** with a few **kittiwakes** and **guillemots** were gathering and actively feeding. There must have been shoals of small fish in the area and for these birds

fish mean food. They were feeding by the pier on the north side of Inverkeithing Inner Bay, at Port Laing and between the railway pier and Long Craig. I watched the varying feeding techniques, the **terns** diving in from a few metres above the water, the **razorbills** diving from the surface and the **kittiwakes** and **black-headed gulls** picking any scraps from the surface of the sea. I assume the fish were sprats, sand-eels or whitebait.

I have had several interesting sightings of wild life recently. Having not seen a **kingfisher** for 3 months I saw 4 in a week. It started in Inverkeithing Inner Bay with a flash of turquoise by a boat moored at the breakers' yard, then one along the Water of Leith, another on the Tay at Dunkeld and finally one by the coastal path between Kinghorn and Kirkcaldy. The last one was very obliging sitting on a rock by the shore. Other unusual sightings have included an **arctic skua** chasing a **Sandwich tern** near Cruickness on the 6th of September and a **tawny owl** calling from the trees at the top of Whinnyknowe on the 4th of September. An **owl** has also been heard since then near Garthhill. On the non-bird front I counted about 50 seals on rocks in the sea near Kirkcaldy on the 3rd of September and also several hauled out on Beamer Rock later that week.

Finally, as usual, a plea to give some of the other species that share our planet the space they need, particularly at this time of year, to feed and lay down fat reserves to help them survive the winter. They need shelter as well so keep at least part of your garden unkempt as well as putting out food for them on a regular basis.

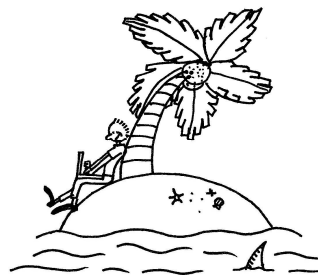


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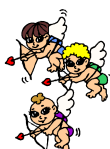
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Walking Group

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Forth Bridge Memorial

A memorial to those who lost their lives building the Forth Bridge has moved a step closer with the formation of the Forth Bridge Memorial Arts Trust.

With its charitable status, the Trust will be eligible to apply for funding from arts bodies and seek business sponsorship, grants and public donations.

NQ Community Council and NQ Heritage Trust are involved, as are the Community Council and History Group from across the river.

The new Trust carries on the work of the Forth Bridge Memorial Committee, set up in January 2005. John Barrett, chair of the committee, said that the launch of the Trust is another milestone on the path to securing a fitting memorial to those who lost their lives during the construction of the bridge. He added that he had spoken to many people in the Queensferry who feel that this memorial is long overdue. Now that charitable status is in place, the Trust will be looking for more groups and funders to play their part in the fund-raising which will be needed to make any memorial a reality.

One of the ideas is to install an artist in residence in each of North and South Queensferry to work with villagers on ideas for the memorial.

For nearly two years, the project has been to compiling a list of those who lost their lives during the construction of the bridge. Records from the time showed that 57 men had died during construction but detailed research has since suggested that the true number was nearer 100.

To begin with, the search turned up the names of John Anderson and a boy named Duffy but scanning the death columns in newspapers uncovered more names. The group enlisted the services of genealogist Sheila Hay to find extra information such as the cause of death.

Her detailed research found many more workers had died, some not actually working on the bridge, but still involved in the construction. Several were also found to have died suffering from Caisson's disease or "the bends". These men were involved in laying the foundations for the giant cantilevers 90 feet below sea level.

Local contacts include Iain Mitchell of the NQ Community Council and James Lawson from the Heritage Trust.
