Ferry Birds -January to May 2010

for their breeding grounds to the north and west. The **redshanks** which winter in West Bay are the obvious ones. This winter the highest count I made was about 40 perched on the floating mooring. At the end of April I searched almost in vain for any waders and only managed to find a couple of oystercatchers. This winter the redshanks were joined by a few turnstones and dunlins. The highest counts were 7 dunlins in West Bay on the 14th of January and 3 turnstones on the rocks by the play area on the 26th of February. One or two turnstones occasionally joined the redshanks on the floating mooring at high tide. The other wintering birds are those you can spot on the sea from the coastal path. This winter was a good one for the variety of species, but not for the overall numbers. The usual goldeneyes and red-breasted mergansers were joined this winter by a small group of common scoters, a single long-tailed duck and up to 4 scaups. These three types of duck regularly winter in the Firth of Forth, but the main concentrations are further out in the estuary at Leven in Fife and between Musselburgh and Gullane in East Lothian. Other birds wintering around our shore are the common resident eiders. shelducks and great-crested and little grebes. These 4 species all breed locally so don't travel far to winter with us. Indeed the eiders and shelducks breed along the coast while the **grebes** breed on fresh water inland.

The winter visitors to North Queensferry have all left for their breeding grounds to the north and west. The **redshanks** which winter in West Bay are the obvious ones. > As I said last time the hard winter weather had brought an unusual bird to Draught Beach. The male **stonechat** was there throughout January and February, but the last time I saw it was on the 1st of March.

> My sightings of other interesting birds include peregrine falcons in Cruicks Quarry on the 26th of February, 6 sightings in March including one over Carlingnose on the 10th and 5 sightings in April. On the 21st of April I spotted a peregrine because of the shower of feathers it was producing as it plucked its prey! A kestrel has also been seen regularly in the lower part of the village. There have been ravens flying around over Cruicks Quarry and they seem to have bred because I saw 2 birds on a nest exercising their wings at the beginning of May. Ravens are one of the earliest breeders so this would not be too surprising. However the most intriguing bird has been a green woodpecker. I have not actually seen it, but have heard one on 4 occasions since March 13th when one was calling by Ferryhills road. Early on the 3rd of April I heard one calling(yaffling) near Northcliffe, then one at the

Community Council

The Community Council has been involved along with Fife Council in facilitating a number of Meetings with regard to future plans for West Bay. These Meetings have been attended by representatives of Save Our Bay, the Boat Club, the Sailing Club, North Queensferry Heritage Trust, the Community Centre, North Queensferry Transition Initiative and other village groups, as well as the Community Council itself.

Under the expert guidance of a Fife Council Facilitator and with helpful and supportive input from representatives of the appropriate departments of Fife Council, those participating have so far concentrated on shared values and philosophies and giving some preliminary thought to the sorts of uses and activities which might take place in this area. What has been remarkable is just how much common ground there is amongst the participants, and how there seems to be a broad consensus on the need for the whole community to be involved in carrying ideas forward. The next

stage is to start putting flesh on the bones of the shared values of community use, equal access, security for existing users, opening up to new uses, sustainability, and the need to start to get to grips with developing appropriate administrative structures.

The group is anxious also to receive input from the wider public. back of Port Laing on the 20th and again near moorhen on the Loch. The little grebe was there Northcliffe on the 24th. To prove I am not imagining this, when I said I had heard the woodpecker some members of the bird walk group on the 5th of May said they had also heard one. Let's hope that there are at least 2 birds and they might be breeding.

The end of March is when the first summer visitors return from their winter sojourn in Africa. Normally the first I see (or hear) locally is the **chiffchaff**. True to form my first was on the 24th near the entrance to Cruicks Quarry. Since then I have heard them regularly while walking the coastal path and even had one singing in my garden on The Brae. Willow warblers and blackcaps return from Africa a little later and I have heard and seen them on The Brae and around the village. Blackcaps seem to be particularly plentiful this year. It never fails to amaze me that these small birds weighing between 10 and 20 grams fly from central Africa across the Sahara desert and then the Mediterranean to Scotland to breed, so as to take advantage of our long summer days and abundant insect life.

Another trans-Saharan migrant is also one of the first to arrive. Sand martins have a breeding colony in Cruicks Quarry and I first saw them back there on the 7th of April which was a little later than usual. Sand martins eat insects catching them on the wing particularly over fresh water. Ferryhills Loch is a good place to see them. Swallows can also be seen there although in smaller numbers. The Loch and its surrounds are a good place to hear chiffchaffs and willow warblers. On the 21st of April I saw a little grebe, a pair of teal, a male mallard and a

again on the 1st of May so please be wary if you walk that way as all four species may well be trying to raise young there.

Another migrant to nest in the area is the **common** tern. As you will remember the Scottish Wildlife Trust has been trying to encourage them to breed on the derelict pier between Carlingnose and Port Laing. On the bird walk I was just saying I had not seen any on the pier when someone said 'that sounds like some terns'. Sure enough there were about half a dozen common terns perched on the end of the pier.

A few more interesting observations include up to 4 shelducks off and on throughout the winter in West Bay. They seemed to come and go at random. On a misty day in February I heard a group of jackdaws passing overhead and I counted a flock of about 15 goldfinches in one of the tall trees along Ferryhills road on the 25th of April. I have also heard a **yellowhammer** singing near Jamestown and by the water tank on Ferryhills.

Please remember there may be breeding birds in your garden at this time of year and go easy on any clearing and pruning. Feeding them is not as important as in winter as there should be lots of insects around for the adults to catch to feed to the young. Good insect protein is essential for the young birds so that they grow quickly into fullyfledged adults.

We found out in March that we have been granted funding for a year of community events and an energy-efficiency project. By the time this edition of the Newsletter reaches you we hope to have a Project Co-ordinator and two Energy Advisors in post and an office in the Reading Room at the Community Centre.

In April, we distributed leaflets about NQTI to every household in the village, along with information about the Station Refurbishment Project and a Community Survey. Thank-you to everyone who completed the survey - we got 100 responses and the feedback was very useful for the NQ Station Trust.

We had our Get Going With Growing Event on the 24th April. This was a great success with around 100 people coming down to the Harbour to visit the Transition Yurt, find out more about what we've got planned and order their tyre-planters, compost mix and seedling for delivery. We distributed almost 50 planters on the day and have since had several orders for more! The event was run along with the new Sailing Club who had one of their boats on show and were delighted with the number of new sailors they signed up.

The Heritage Trust is delighted to introduce to the community, Andrew Dodds as the manager of the Light Tower, a new visitor attraction to the area. If you have not yet had the opportunity of visiting the tower which is now open every day please accept a welcome

invitation from the Trust. At the moment until after the 22nd June our 'official opening day' there is no charge to inspect everything that has been done to restore the tower including the installation of the original lighting system, a whale oil storage tank and a small 'lightkeeper's' stove. However it will not be possible to light the lamp until after the opening ceremony. Andrew is there to not only look after the Light Tower but to help with any specific questions you may have on its history as well as in the wider context of the pier and Queensferry Passage.

The opening of the light tower is the start of the Trust's policy to develop specific sites in the North Queensferry Peninsula that will enhance resident and visitor experience with up to date information on their historical relevance. As an example, new information panels on the history of the Queensferry Passage and Light Tower are currently being prepared, in conjunction with Fife Council, for display on the Town Pier and should shortly be in position.

The Rotary Club of Inverkeithing and Dalgety Bay, which also operates in Aberdour and North Queensferry, will hold its annual sponsored charity walk from Inverkeithing to the Silver Sands in Aberdour on Sunday 12 September. The Rotary walk is now well established as a major fundraising event in West Fife. Participants enjoy a pleasant day out on the attractive six mile stretch of the Fife coastal path and a barbeque is provided for all at the finish on the Silver Sands. Walkers also receive a certificate that confirms their participation. Since the Club's first charity walk in 2003 the Rotary Club has raised more than £25,000 for local charities, with the largest share going to the Children's Hospice Association of Scotland. More than 100 walkers take part each year.

A well established practice is for local organisations and clubs to join the walk as a group and raise sponsorship that is divided between the Rotary Club's chosen charity and participating clubs' own funds. This has proven to be a very effective way for local clubs and organisations to both raise funds for themselves and contribute to other deserving causes. It means, too, that all of the organising is done by the Rotary Club and participants don't need to consider health and safety issues, stewarding or publicity. The walk usually gets good coverage in the local press. In recent years local scouts, the Boys Brigade, sports clubs and church groups have taken part in the walk as a fundraising exercise.


Boat Club
