The West Bay Steering Group

For six years now there has been a question mark hanging over the future of West Bay. This is the area of land and piers currently occupied by The Boat Club and by Balfour Beatty who use the area as a car park. Last November, a number of community groups, local councillors and Fife Council officials got together under the auspices of North Queensferry Community Council to discuss the future of the area.

The groups involved represent a very wide range of community interests: The Community Council, Community Centre, School Parent Council, Transition Initiative Group, Boat Club, Sailing Club, Save Our Bay and Heritage Trust. Over the last 6 months the members of the group have had 3 consultation mornings which have been guided by an independent facilitator paid for by Fife Council. These meetings have found a strong consensus around the idea of community ownership and the desire to look after the land in a way which keeps the area public and which benefits all the users of the bay area.

To develop this further the group has now formalised itself as the West Bay Steering Group. The aim of this group is to work together to identify the community's needs and wishes, to develop a sustainable plan for the area and to bring into being an appropriate accountable trust or body to take ownership of the land.

During the consultation mornings, the West Bay Steering Group members have agreed on a set of shared values for this area. There are also lots of ideas within the group about what sort of development might be possible. This is a community project so the next step is to establish a wider consultation with the community about what you would like to see happening in West Bay. That's why we're setting up a 'Big Breakfast' Drop in consultation morning on Saturday 20th November at the Community Centre.

The idea is that during the morning residents can drop in to the community centre. There will be display boards with information about the area and the Steering Group. There will be people on hand from West Bay Steering Group and Fife Council to answer any questions you may have. There will be a chance to have

a think about the area and put forward your thoughts and ideas. What sort of West Bay would you like to see? It will only take a few minutes to drop in and have your say and there will be bacon rolls and tea and coffee available in order to help the brain cells get into gear on a chilly Saturday morning

The West Bay Steering Group is run through The Community Council. If you would like to know more or desire any further information then please attend the next Community Council meeting which will be held on Thursday 9th November at 7.30pm in the Community Centre.

Community Centre

The existing committee (lain Whyte, Jill Brown, Brian Armstrong, Christina Mackenzie, Greta Dyce and Lucy Macaulay) were re-elected and two further members, Leonard Gray and Adam Nosal, co-opted to the committee since the AGM had their election confirmed. Despite appeals for more nominations none were forthcoming. There are still spaces on the committee and anyone interested should contact the Secretary at 417429.

A further fundraising event is planned for Saturday 27th November (close to St Andrew's Day) which we hope will be well supported.

Ferry Birds -May to Sept 2010

The breeding birds around the village seem to have done reasonably well. In June broods of eiders came and went in West Bay. Many small young don't survive the onslaught from the bigger gulls, although enough appear to do so to maintain overall numbers. The **common terns** on the derelict pier also seem to have done well. I saw about 80 adults there in May and several young later on. I didn't monitor them as closely as I did last year, but I think they were fairly successful. The local peregrines were successful as were the sand martins in the In early September I saw about 200 swallows and sand martins on the power lines at the quarry entrance. I also saw 4 well-grown young shelducks with their parents in Inverkeithing Inner Bay in the middle of August. It is difficult to know how well the commoner resident birds fared. I have certainly seen plenty of robins, goldfinches and long-tailed tits on my walks around the village although there seem to fewer house sparrows and starlings. On a walk around the North Queensferry peninsula on the 2nd of October I saw 35 different kinds of bird. I took in most of the different habitats such as the lower village, West Bay, Ferry Loch, the Water Tank and the coastal path. The highlights included a treecreeper in the woods by the side of Ferry Road, 2 buzzards over the north end of the Road Bridge, a peregrine over the quarry and a grey wagtail at Port Laing. Other good counts were

about 40 **redshanks** on the floating mooring in West Bay, nearly 30 **oystercatchers** on the rocky beach just west of the Road Bridge, and 3 **great-crested grebes** in Inverkeithing Inner Bay.

I wrote in May that I had heard a green woodpecker in the village several times. Unfortunately I have nothing further to report. Anyone who may have heard or seen one please let me know. Other more unusual birds I have seen or heard over the summer have included a tawny owl calling on the evening of the 19th of August, a sparrowhawk over The Brae on the 16th and 25th of September and a peregrine which was found injured in a garden in the lower village. This was a female which had a damaged wing. It was caught, fed and watered and then taken to The SPCA Middlebank Wildlife Centre where, as far as I know, it remains. Although not unusual, grey herons have been seen in West Bay and on the rocky islands between the Railway Pier and the Road Bridge and I saw 7 of them hanging around at high tide above the shoreline between the Road Bridge and St Margaret's Marsh in September.

The onset of autumn was (a little early maybe?) as usual heralded by the return of a few **redshanks** to West Bay. Having been absent for most of May and June a few were spotted in the last week of June which maintains their remarkably consistent date of return over the last few years. The **Sandwich terns** then appeared in good numbers at the end of July. They seem to move from their breeding grounds to

Transition Initiative

The Transition Initiative is delighted to introduce our Carbon Cutters energy efficiency project team. Our Project Coordinator, Gina Martin and two Energy Advisers, Neil MacDougall and Jess Woodall started in June and have been busy establishing our Carbon Cutters energy efficiency project in the village.

The funding we received from the Climate Challenge Fund has enabled us to set up a free home energy efficiency support service which is available to anyone in the village who would like to take part. As part of the service, we're offering home energy visits and advice and support on how to reduce energy bills and improve energy efficiency in the home. We're also working with the Energy Savings Scotland advice centre and Fife Council to help people access financial assistance and discounts which might be available.

Since we started in June we have signed up over 40 households to Carbon Cutters and have already identified potential savings of around 20% on their energy bills through simple measures such as loft insulation, installing heating controls, changing to energy efficient light bulbs and switching off appli-

ances when not in use. For the households we have worked with so far, these relatively straightforward changes could save them between £250 and £800 on their energy bills. This success is putting us well on the way to reducing our CO_2 emissions in the village by 51 tonnes by March next year so a big thank you to everyone who has taken part so far!

Carbon Cutters now has our office established in the Community Centre and anyone can pop in for some advice during our Advice Place opening times (**Tuesdays and Thursdays, 10am to 12pm**). We have also developed a library of books on energy efficiency which is available to anyone to borrow.

Our next phase of work is to link in with community groups in the village and we are available to come and give a small presentation to your group on the work we're doing and how we might be able to help you.

The Forth Estuary at this time to fatten up before hands down. they migrate to West Africa for the winter. They often fly around in pairs with the young birds calling for food and being fed on the surface when the adult has caught a sand eel. The young have also to learn to catch their own food before they start their migration. I saw several Sandwich terns from the coastal path near Kirkcaldy on the 2nd of October. Another sign of the changing seasons is the return of little grebes and great-crested grebes to the coast. There was a pair of the latter in Inverkeithing Inner Bay on the 1st of October and 5 little grebes there on the 5th of October.

Autumn is the time to see gannets in Inverkeithing Bay. In favourable conditions hundreds can be seen circling round, on the water and occasionally diving into the sea searching for food. The bird walk on the 18th of September was well timed. I reckoned there were at least 300 gannets, nearly all immature birds, in the bay. The young having been fattened up on the nests on the Bass Rock are often so full of food that they have difficulty taking off from the sea. Except for the gannets we didn't see many birds on the walk although there were a few Sandwich terns and eiders along the coast and we did hear a **chiffchaff** in the trees at the south end of Port Laing. The earlier family nature walk on the 30th of June was rather disappointing mainly I think because it was the evening when Andy Murray was playing at Wimbledon. He won the match

Some of you will have seen the articles in the press about a decline in the numbers of chaffinches. It has been suggested that this has been caused by dirty bird feeders. Don't stop feeding the birds this winter but clean the feeder thoroughly before you use it and clean it regularly thereafter.

Management of the plants on Carlingnose Reserve began in October. The grassland will be cut and some of the gorse and other invasive species will be removed. This is all part of the work which has to be done to maintain the calcareous grassland which is, of course, the reason why it is a reserve in the first place. One of the plants which grow in this habitat is the field gentian. This seemed to have disappeared from the reserve but made a big comeback this year. The plant grows where the grass is short and is often associated with areas where rabbits graze. At the beginning of August I counted at least 50 flowering spikes on the reserve. It has beautiful blue-violet bell-shaped flowers which often only open in sunshine. It is great that the plant has reappeared and let us all hope that it is here to stay. The other plants of particular importance on the reserve are bloody cranesbill, lesser meadow-rue and dropwort. They all seem to have done well this year and, with the continuing success of the **common terns** means the reserve is in great shape.

Sailing Club

We have also had another generous round of funding from the Community Council which has allowed us to buy more safety gear to keep people warm and safe when they are taking part in sailing. We would again like to say thank you to the Community Council for their continued help. On that note we would also like to say thank you to Network Rail and Balfour Beatty for stepping in to provide boat storage at the Rail Bridge. This season would definitely not have happened without their help!

On the not so positive side, we were not able to do anything with the many adults who have joined the



club. This has been disappointing and is mainly down to 'logistics and staffing issues' i.e. not enough boats, rescue boats, instructors or rescue boat drivers. So our winter jobs for this year, in addition to maintenance of the boats and laying moorings (oh, we now have permission to lay moorings in the bay at the town

pier!), will be to put another person through the RYA instructor course and to get more people trained on driving rescue boats. This will allow us to run more lessons next year for everyone that wants to take

So, over the winter we are putting together the agenda for next year. In addition to a season's worth of sailing lessons for kids and adults we also hope to hold a few 'socials' in the village, for members and non members alike. Talking about books

We have been quietly meeting once every month and getting on with it for years without making a fuss. But we thought that we should come out and let everyone in on our secret.

There is a reading group in the village. And since we have just put together our subscriptions to start another year, we know that we must have been around for four years. Because we have been just the right size, we have not been seeking more members. But we have recently lost some core members, and there is space for new members to join in the fun. Charmaine and George McKissock, who left the village a few months ago, were two of the founding members of the group. And Jenny and Martin Eastwood are also planning to move south.

When we started, we chose to join up with Fife Libraries reading-group service. It is very simple, and it has worked really well. We each pay about £1.50 for the year. And Fife Libraries sends us a box of ten copies of a book for us to read and talk about. The library service now has between 150 and 200 sets of books at its reading-group headquarters in Kirkcaldy. When we started there were already almost 100 other reading groups signed up with Fife Libraries. The reading group service keeps account of which books we have had, so that they can be sure to send us something new each time.

We take it in turn to meet in members' houses. We meet on a Sunday afternoon at 4 pm, and settle down to talk about the book that we have had for the last month. At the end of the meeting, we all get to find out what our next book will be.

Probably the most important reason to the size of the group is the need to give ever a chance to tell the group their take on the book that within a couple of hours.

The beauty of relying on Fife Libraries is that we never know what will turn up. Every so often we get copies of the complete list of books for reading-groups, and each time the list is longer. We must have had more than 40 books to read and discuss over our four years. And many of them have been complete surprises. Those of us who have not been accustomed to reading works of fiction (setting aside that holiday novel or that airport detective story) have enjoyed a double pleasure.

One pleasure is the discovery of books that we would never have chosen for ourselves. And there have been many authors who have been new to all or most of us, and whose other books we want to go away and find for ourselves. The second pleasure is one that all of us have enjoyed. If you are going to talk about a book that you have read, you need to stop and think in order to work out what the book has meant to you. And then it is really interesting to hear how the same book has affected other members of the group.

It is rare for us all to agree on liking a particular book, but even when we do it is for different reasons.

Usually, opinions are divided and it makes for long discussions to discover why someone has disliked some aspects of a book that you found exceptionally good. There have been books that have beaten us and one or two that we have all disliked – but always for different reasons. For me, finding what the other members of the group have made of a book has been a doubling of the pleasure of reading. In the light of what one reader has said about a book, I have heard other members of the group say that they must go back and read that passage, or the whole book, again.

We have read Sebastian Faulk's Birdsong, Isabelle Allende's Daughter of Fortune, Nicholas Montsarrat's The Cruel Sea, Khaled Hosseini's The Kite Flyer, Cormac McCarthy's The Road (before the film came out), Michael Frayn's Headlong, and Mary Ann Shaffer's The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society. A real mixture, and almost every book that has come our way, we have felt, was worth the effort and taught us something.

Right now, there are spaces in the groups for some new members. We are limited to about 12 people, because we get 10 copies of each book (and fortunately there are one or two couples who can share a copy). There is also the matter of getting all the group sat down in someone's house (but there are often one or two people who cannot come, and have to send their views on the book with someone else). Probably the most important reason to limit the size of the group is the need to give everyone a chance to tell the group their take on the book in hand, and to do that within a couple of hours.


Of course, if lots and lots of potential new reading group members came forward, there would be nothing to stop us from forming a second (or a third) reading group, meeting on a different day at a different time. Apart from a handful of curious readers, the only requirement for the functioning of the group is for one member to be willing to collect and return the blue crates of books to Inverkeithing Library, which is where they are delivered from the Kirkcaldy HQ.

North Queensferry Traffic Survey Summary, for North Queensferry Heritage Trust




This first chart shows how the traffic has varied throughout the year. The Commercial Vehicle and Coach traffic is pretty steady, while the number of cars seems to increase in the summer months.

The second chart shows how traffic varies across the three sample periods. There are about 8 commercial vehicles per hour morning, noon and afternoon. Car traffic averages about 10 cars per hour in the morning, peaks around 35 cars per hour at lunchtime, and drops to about 24 cars per hour in the afternoon slot.

Over the past school year, Mark Wallace, our lollipop man, has been conducting an informal traffic survey, as he safeguards children crossing the road, in the morning, lunchtime and afternoon. The survey lists the number of cars, commercial vehicles (vans and lorries) and coaches passing the War Memorial on two days each month.

Traffic was recorded from 08:30 to 09:15; from 11:55 to 13:30; and from 15:05 to 15:45.

Why watching TV at school can be a good thing.

Scotland's first school-based TV network has been launched across Fife thanks to a pioneering initiative to promote healthy-living information to the region's secondary pupils.

The idea comes from Fife Sports and Leisure Trust, Fife's leading provider of sports and leisure facilities and makes use of plasma screens fitted in all 19 secondary schools.

The screens will be managed centrally by the Trust and will feature a range of content such as cookery displays, video case studies showcasing pupils' active lifestyles, general public information films and newsfeeds.

Over 21,000 Fife pupils will have access to the plasma screens which are positioned in communal areas around school buildings.

The idea for the school TV network was developed by Steve Donnelly, Multimedia Coordinator, Fife Sports and Leisure Trust. He explains: "I became aware of the screens through work I was doing with the schools and I felt that there was potential to widen their use to incorporate health and lifestyle messages aimed at young people.

"Following discussions and support from a partner organisation and the schools' Business Managers, I took responsibility for networking all the screens, so that content can be shown on a Fife-wide basis or by individual schools, allowing messages to be tailored as necessary.

"Eventually, I hope that schools will encourage pupils to generate content for display, such as fashion shows, battle of the bands and school projects, and that the network becomes a catalyst for creativity which both young people and staff can enjoy."

Supporting the initiative and contributing its very own budding celebrity chef is Catering and Cleaning Services, a division of Fife Council, which operates the region's school kitchen and dining facilities.

Keith Breasley, Services Hospitality Services Officer for Catering and Cleaning Services, said: "Although we were using the screens prior to the Trust's involvement to display menu information and catering updates, we feel this initiative will allow us to engage far more effectively with pupils.

"Messages about healthy eating and active lifestyles go hand-in-hand, so when Steve came to me with his idea I thought it was a really exciting opportunity and we were more than happy to work in partnership to get all the schools on board."

Tom Will, one the organisation's chefs, will feature regularly on the network demonstrating how to

prepare simple healthy meals and he's turned out to be a natural in front of the camera.

Tom added: "I have to say I was a bit nervous to begin with, although I'm an experienced chef, it's the first time I've had to cook in front of the camera – but I think I got the hang of it and I'm looking forward to my next star appearance!"

Rector of Glenwood High School, Neil McNeil, said: "This is an excellent opportunity to add to the work of Glenwood High School in addressing the national health and well being agenda.

"Furthermore, it will offer opportunities for pupils to become involved in what should be displayed, in their school, for maximum impact. This, in turn, leads to them becoming responsible people who make an effective contribution to society. For once I am comfortable with my pupils watching more television."

Fife Sports and Leisure Trust's Chief Executive, Ed Watson, added: "The Trust has always had a good working relationship with the area's schools – it's important to us that pupils can take full advantage of our facilities and activities on offer and enjoy an active lifestyle.

"The Trust's initiative to co-ordinate and manage the plasma screens is taking our relationship a step further and offers a fantastic opportunity to engage more closely with young people. This is true not just for us, but also other partner organisations across Fife, such as NHS Fife, Fife Council and Police, who can now use the TV network to promote their own messages relevant to secondary pupils."
