Ferry Birds - January to May 2011 by John Done

Fortunately for the avian visitors and residents of North they also illustrate how tough some of our birds are. Queensferry the cold weather of November and December didn't last. In the new year the numbers of sea ducks did pick up a little, but were still lower than a few years ago. The highest number of red-breasted mergansers was 32 in Port Laing on the 10th of March and there were about 80 eiders sheltering from the wind off Port Laing on the 21st. There were also a few grebes along the coast during the early part of the year. The stars of West Bay were the shelducks which peaked at 11 on the 5th of January. There has been at least one **shelduck** in the bay at the beginning of May and I wonder if a pair is nesting. They usually nest in holes, often in old rabbit burrows, but the sides of West Bay where there are boulder slopes may give the pair enough cover for a nest. Keep a look out in the next few weeks. The **shelducks** were joined on a few occasions by one or two mallards and the redshanks, curlews oystercatchers and a few turnstones were there all the time. The redshanks and curlews disappeared about the usual date to return to their breeding grounds. I searched in vain for any waders in West Bay on the 24th of April although I did see 2 **oystercatchers** there the following day.

Most of our summer visitors have now well and truly arrived. The first, as usual, were chiffchaffs. My first was one calling at Carlingnose Point on the 21st of March. Thereafter they seemed to be everywhere and were joined about a week later by sand martins and blackcaps. The sand martins have now re-formed their colony in Cruicks Quarry and you will see dozens from the coastal path near the quarry entrance along with a few swallows. I have also seen one or two swallows in the village. The most ubiquitous summer visitor is the willow warbler which, as long as there are a few trees around, settles down and starts singing. The most recent summer visitors to arrive are the common terns. I saw a few flying around Long Craig on the 5th and 8th of May calling incessantly with many of them carrying a sand eel in their bills. You can just imagine the eiders thinking there goes our peace and quiet for a few months and just looking forward to the autumn when the terns go back to West Africa!

Strictly speaking the **fulmars** on Inchgarvie and the quarry above Deep Sea World are the first summer visitors to return, but they are only away from their nesting areas for perhaps 10 weeks in early autumn and can be seen at some colonies on the east coast of Scotland off and on throughout the winter. Birds return to Inchgarvie in January and hang around for a few days before disappearing and returning several days later. This behaviour continues until early May when the eggs are laid. The adults share the incubation until the eggs hatch after about 50 days and 40 days later the young fledge.

I have had guite a few unusual sightings over the past few months. Some of these may have been the result of the cold weather in November and December, but

Goldcrests are the smallest British (and European) bird weighing about 6 grams and I was very pleased to see one in my garden on the 3rd of March and another one near Port Laing on the 18th of March. How they had managed to survive the cold spell I can't imagine. I saw a brambling amongst a flock of chaffinches from the coastal path on the 12th of February. **Bramblings** are regular winter visitors to Scotland and have bred a few times. They are closely related to chaffinches and breed widely in Scandinavia. There were also a few **tree sparrows** in the flock. Tree sparrows are a slightly smaller, neater version of the house sparrow with a brown top of the head and a distinctive brown 'ear' spot. They declined in the UK between 1970 and 1995 by almost 90%, but have recovered since then. My recent observations seem to agree with this. I used to see them at Port Laing 20 years ago and I have seen them from the coastal path near the derelict pier a couple of times recently. Another bird which has declined in Scotland is the **kestrel**. It used to be very common; often seen hovering above motorway verges searching for voles and mice. Although they do appear to be less common I saw a pair of **kestrels** by the mouth of the Keithing burn in Inverkeithing on the 16th of March and also one perched on one of the cranes in the breakers yard on the 8th of May. Other interesting sightings have included 2 ravens over the guarry on the 11th of February, a pair of **shoveler** ducks on the sea near Port Laing on the 7th of April and peregrine falcons over the quarry several times in March, April and May. Another resurgent bird on Ferryhills is the yellowham-I have heard several calling while walking towards Jamestown. As its name suggests the male has a brilliant yellow head which makes it remarkably inconspicuous when it is perched on top of a gorse bush in full flower. This is another bird which seems to be making a local comeback.

On a non-bird topic many of you will have seen the hundreds, if not thousands of black flies around the gorse on Ferryhills. They are St Mark's flies. They are meant to appear (you've guessed) about the 25th of April. The males are the obvious ones as they dangle their legs beneath their bodies. They are flying around looking for females and after mating and laying their eggs in the soil only live for about a week. Their larvae live in the leaf litter and the adults emerge in April and May the following year to start all over again. The huge numbers may be a consequence of the cold spell last winter. The snow will have covered the leaf litter and so hidden the larvae and pupae from their predators. The snow also acts as an insulating layer and will have protected them from the intense cold. You may have seen reports in The Press of this theory being used to predict that there will be huge numbers of midges in the Highlands this summer. You have been warned!

Community Council

Since the previous issue of Ferry News your Community Councillors have been busy on a number of issues affecting the community. Thanks to the efforts of Myles Fitt and Colin Bell, the new North Queensferry Community Council website is now live! This revamped site is intended to give you the latest news regarding key issues affecting the village which the Community Council is discussing, such as the plans for further blasting at Cruicks Quarry and the proposals for a biomass plant in nearby Rosyth. We also want the website to act as THE point of information about what is going on in the village. We will advertise any relevant activity in our 'news' section and include it on our diary planner. The website also gives the usual background information about what the Community Council is and does, who your Community Councillors are and how to contact them. We want this website to work for you so if you have any events you want advertised or have any suggestions for improving the site please contact Myles Fitt (email via the NQCC website). In the meantime please let others know about the website and how they can use it so it can be of benefit to all in the community. The website address is www.ngcc.co.uk. Hope you can visit it soon.

By the time this goes to print, the various flower tubs around the village and the Jubilee Well area of The Brae will have been weeded and replanted, thanks to the sterling efforts of Jan Short and a few helpers. If you are able to assist her in the future, please give her a call on 416492 and let her have your contact details. Hopefully, we shall soon take delivery of a new village notice board, funded to a large degree by generous donations from the Community Centre, Heritage Trust and Carbon Cutters Initiative, to replace the very dilapidated one at the station.

Since the contract for the Forth Replacement Crossing was awarded, Community Forums have been established to provide effective community engagement with Transport Scotland and the three main contractors. Community Councillors will attend

the forums concerned, which the general public are entitled to attend as observers. Transport Scotland will also arrange a 'meet the contractor' meeting soon, which will take the form of a public meeting. The date will be promulgated when known.

Although the recent warm weather has pushed it to the back of people's minds, some work has been done on how in future we can provide a more effective self help, community based response to the type of severe weather we experienced in December.

In these and all its activities the Community Council remains very conscious that it must represent impartially the views and concerns of all residents. It is hoped that the new website will provide an additional opportunity for people to contact us with their concerns, questions and views. Meetings continue to be held in the Community Centre on the second Thursday of each month, commencing at 7.30 pm. The next meeting on 9th June will be preceded by the AGM, also commencing at 7.30 pm, to which everyone is warmly invited. Minutes of meetings are available on the new website, in addition to being posted on village notice boards.

They are attracted to NQBC because of the forward thinking, ambition and community spirited contribution the club demonstrates. The Boat and Harbour Festival has put North Queensferry on the events map; soon there shall be the resurrection of the Skiff racing between North and South Queensferry, (see article below), with the North Queensferry Team being made up and managed not by NQBC but by self organising local people who are proud to represent their village in the true sense and spirit. Boat and Harbour Festival 28 August 2011

The NQ Boat and Harbour Festival has been put back 24 hours to Sunday 28 August. This year it shall be part of a Weekend of Fun with the NQ Heritage Trust's Village Show on the Saturday and our festival following on the Sunday.

This year we have booked the Scottish Fisheries Museum's Iconic Herring Drifter the Reaper to be the main marine attraction, with various other interesting and traditional crafts, plus there shall be visiting Sea Kayak groups, boat rides out to the Bridges (weather permitting), a Sub Aqua display, plus the Coastal Rowing Projects events. On land we shall have the

popular craft fair, the famous Arbroath Smokies (everybody's favourite), a unit from Fife Fire Brigade who shall be putting on a display of putting out a fire, the model boat pond shall be back for all the kids, young and old, our resident clown and of course the kids roundabouts, live music and song all day, craft demonstrations including a traditional rocking horse maker, log cutting from Gal Gaels wood Mizer, wood carving, plus much more.

The gates open at 12:30 to 17:00 with the entry being held at last years prices, Adults £4:00 children and concessions £2:00.

West Bay Steering Group

The West Bay Steering Group recently completed an extensive consultation exercise with North Queensferry residents, including sending a guestionnaire to every household in the village. As reported in the Dunfermline Press, the results of the public consultation questionnaire survey were received in March. Copies of the full report are available in the Community Centre and can also be accessed on the Community Council's new website at www.nqcc.co.uk . Many constructive suggestions were made, but the main themes to emerge were a desire to keep some green and open space for residents to enjoy, to tidy up the area by removing abandoned boats and other discarded items, to create a properly delineated boat storage area and to encourage the establishment of an active boat / sailing club and other facilities that are open to all.

Since then the steering group has been busy producing a business plan and agreeing the appropriate legal framework necessary to take forward its plans to take the area into community ownership or long term lease. It has been agreed that the best way forward is the establishment of a Scottish Charity in the form of a Company Limited by Guarantee, and it is anticipated that the necessary Articles of Association and registration with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator will be completed shortly. As we move from being a 'steering group' to a legally recognised entity, it is necessary to establish a name for the Trust. North Queensferry Community Trust has been selected as being the most appropriate, reflecting as it does the fact that representatives of eight separate village organisations participated in the steering group.

Membership of the Trust will be open to all individuals aged 16 or over who are ordinarily resident within the electoral boundaries of North Queensferry Community Council. This reflects the strong support which emerged from the survey questionnaire that the area should be managed by the North Queensferry community for the benefit of the community. All members will be eligible to vote to elect the directors of the Trust, who will be accountable to village residents.

It would perhaps be both timely and helpful to stress that the Community Trust is wholly separate from the North Queensferry Harbour Trust, which was set up by the North Queensferry Boat Club following its withdrawal from the West Bay Steering Group.

This has nevertheless left Fife Council in a difficult position with two Trusts seeking to manage the same area. It has accordingly, as an interim solution, offered each Trust a short term lease on separate areas of the former railway pier site. The Community Trust has agreed in principle to accept such a lease, whilst its long term aim remains to

obtain a long term lease of the whole area in order fully to develop it for the good of the whole community, both residents and harbour users. The Community Trust's business plan makes provision for the continued existence of a thriving boat club on part of the site and in view of this we look forward to working co-operatively with all the users of the area.

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North Queensferry Twinned With Hohoe In Ghana

North Queensferry Parish Church has a history and variety of involvement with the world church. It has a long standing support for the Chegoria Hospital, for the annual visitations of the children of Chernobyl, it promotes and supports the sending of Amnesty international Christmas cards, the Blythswood Christmas shoe box appeal and supports the Homeless World Cup. In order to promote and support these causes it engages in fund raising through coffee mornings, soup and sandwich brunches and church fetes, all of which are very well supported by the community

Following discussions in early 2009 between Rev. Chris Park and Jan and Douglas Short, and subsequently, at a public meeting, it was agreed to pursue a twinning relationship with another country.

The Kirk Session agreed that a small working group, (Rev Chris Park, Chris Duguid, Janet King, Jan Short and Douglas Short), should complete and submit our congregational profile to the Church of Scotland World Mission Council (CoS. WMC).

During 2010 we received three profiles via the CoS. WMC, one each from Kenya, Jamaica and Hohoe Presbyterian Church in Ghana. After much thought and discussion it was decided that the church in Hohoe was the one which we felt best matched our profile and as such would best help our church and community to broaden its horizons, harness its strengths for a greater good and learn through a sharing of faith and life experiences.

Hohoe: pronounced "Ho Whey" is in the Volta Region of the middle belt zone of Ghana. It is in the northern part of the region and has a population of approx 7000.

Hohoe is surrounded by a cluster of mountains and rich natural attractions including Mount Afadjato, the highest mountain in the country, the Wli Waterfalls, the highest falls in West Africa and the Tafi Monkey Sanctuary.

Like North Queensferry, the church in Hohoe is very much part of the community and has a very close link with the local school, funding some of the teachers salaries.

Our Head Teacher here in North Queensferry, Sally Hourston, is very enthusiastic about the twinning, so much so that she has agreed to join the committee. She sees this as an ideal way for the children to gain a wider experience of the issues relating to global citizenship.

The twinning is at the very early stages of its development, a development which has been described more as a journey, and like many journeys we are not quite sure where it might lead. Making it all the more exciting!!

The British Federation of Film Societies (BFFS) have provided the equipment – including a very impressive 16 foot screen, state of the art projector and professional sound equipment. We've done 5 screenings so far and you'll be pleased to know its not too late to join us for our family screening of Bugsy Malone on the June 12th.

The programme so far has offered an eclectic mix of films from around the world and across the ages. 'Fargo', 'My Neighbour Totoro', 'Together', 'It Happened One Night' and 'The King's Speech' have all featured so far. Knowing that people can go to the local Odeon to watch new release films (for nearly twice the price) we thought a different selection of films might be worth a try. The good news is that each screening has been universally praised, when we asked residents to score the experience at the end of the film, almost all people said they 'loved it'.

After our latest screening of the Oscar winning 1930's classic 'It Happened One Night', a Ferryhills Rd resident said "I'm so enjoying the Red Cinema - where else could you walk round the corner from your house, bump into lot's of friends, have a glass of wine and some popcorn and watch a great film on a huge cinema screen - and all for under a fiver??"

Each screening costs about £200, (covering licensing, Fife Council fee for the school, equipment fees, cost of black out blinds etc) so the £4 ticket doesn't quite cover our costs, but helps us along the way!

Heritage Trust

The Trust continues to operate the Light Tower this year as a visitor attraction. It will be open on weekends and public holidays but during the week only by appointment by telephoning 07852 437384.

The Trust has recently acquired the 1911 North Queensferry Census records to add to our archives. This information is now being processed into electronic format and it is hoped to have this available for viewing at the Village Show.

The Trust has also acquired the well established 'Forth Bridges Exhibition and artifacts' from the Forth Bridges Visitor Centre Trust (now disbanded). The intention is to add to the exhibition the latest information on the bridge refurbishment giving North Queensferry an excellent legacy of what is Scotland's best known icon. It is hoped that the exhibition, with all the additions, will also be available for viewing at the Village Show.

The 360th anniversary of the Battle of Inverkeithing occurs on 20th July 2011. This battle between the Royalist forces of Scotland under Charles II and Oliver Cromwell's army is little known but was decisive in the eventual outcome of the 'English Civil War'. The consequences of the defeat of the Scotlish forces played an important part in the subsequent history and development of Scotland.

The Trust, with other partners, plans to construct various **Viewing Points** on the Ferryhills overlooking the battlefield and events that led up to it. These points will be easily accessible to walkers and the proposal is to construct these on the existing defence line of the Cromwellian troop displaying the action of the battle as seen by the victorious general John Lambert.



Transition Initiative

Last year was very busy and we hope you enjoyed our Food Fest, or benefited from our Carbon Cutters project. We wanted to tell you some of the highlights of the last year and our plans for the coming months.

Carbon Cutters Project

- 46 households in the village took part and many more came along for some one-off advice.
- We provided home energy monitors, draught-testing, thermal imaging surveys and renewable's case studies
- Most households found they could reduce their energy use by around 1/3 by adopting a range of energy saving measures from adjusting heating controls and changing lightbulbs to fitting insulation or replacing hoilers
- We exceeded our target of making 51 tonnes of carbon savings to reach 58 tonnes. This is an amazing result in less than one year and shows the level of commitment our community has made to taking action on the advice and improving how we use energy.

Low energy light offer

Even near the end of our project our energy advisors were looking for ways to save North Queensferry

The Rotary Club

In recent weeks the Rotary Club of Inverkeithing and Dalgety Bay (whose area also includes North Queensferry) has been active in supporting several deserving international appeals. Water Boxes and LifeStraws, which allow families to purify water in areas affected by natural disasters, have been sent to Haiti and Pakistan and shoe boxes, filled with a range of useful household items, have been provided as part of a national Rotary initiative in support of families in eastern Europe. Nearer to home, significant financial donations have been made to MacMillan Cancer Care and to Maggie's Centres in Kirkcaldy and Edinburgh. The club's grand charity raffle, held earlier in the year, raised £1,500 for Piggy Bank Kids, the charity fronted by Sarah Brown that supports research into premature births and provides practical support to families of vulnerable new born children. The charity's recently established "granny school" has proved to be very successful in Fife and may be rolled out in other NHS areas. Two major fund raising events were held in February. A casino night in Aberdour golf club raised £1,000 for Fife SANDS, the stillbirth and neonatal death charity which supports families that have suffered the death of a baby in pregnancy or soon after birth. And the club's coffee morning and charity sale in the Church Hall. Aberdour raised over £1,250 for Rotary International's End Polio Now campaign which aims to eradicate polio from the four countries - Pakistan, Afghanistan, India and Nigeria – where it remains endemic. The Club is grateful for the support it received for both these events.

A capacity audience enjoyed Inverkeithing High School's Spring Concert on 17 March, with an ambitious programme that ranged from well known classical pieces through jazz and traditional Scottish music to solo and choir singing. The concert was organised jointly by the High School music department and the Rotary Club. The proceeds from the evening amounted to £1600 and will be divided between the school's music department and the Rotary Club's fund for local charities.

The walk is now a major charity event in West Fife. Clubs and societies that take part in the walk can contribute to the Rotary charities that benefit from the walk and at the same time raise funds for their own organisations. Last year more than 30 clubs and organisations participated in the walk, raising more than £5,000 for local charities and retaining up to 50% of what they raised for their own organisations.
