Community Centre

At long last the new kitchen is up and running in the Community Centre and we hope that it will help to attract a number of local individuals and groups to hold functions in the Centre. The Annual Fundraising Celidh on Saturday 4th February will be the first major event with the kitchen in use.

We plan to go into partnership with the newly formed Community Trust to enable the proposed Multi-Use Games Area next to the Community Centre, This will be a project that will be benefit many in the community, young and not so young, and already the school has taken an interest in it.

There are several exhibitions in the Centre at present. The Heritage Trust has an exhibition of the history of the Forth Rail Bridge. The Church has a display of pictures showing the exact location of Hohoe on the map of Africa, the church and school buildings and some of the local community.

Community Trust

North Queensferry Community Trust is a Community Company which, to quote its Articles of Association, exists "to promote, manage and develop activities and projects for the benefit and development of the communities within the electoral boundaries of North Queensferry Community Council". It can develop such projects itself or through working in partnership with other organisations in the village. It takes the form of a Company incorporated by guarantee and is recognised by OSCR as a Charity.

It has a wide membership drawn from all around the village, and many members were present for the Company's inaugural Annual General Meeting which was held in the Community Centre on Wednesday 23rd November, where the following directors were elected: David Grieg, Daniel Howie, Andrew Jones, Christina McKenzie, Iain Mitchell, Susan Reekie, Derek Timmins, and Paul Tucker. The Board held its first meeting in December and Lucie Macaulay was co-opted as a director, Christina McKenzie confirmed as Company Secretary and Iain Mitchell elected Chairman.

The first major project which the Trust has decided to undertake is to work with North Queensferry Community Centre to create a new Multi-use Games area adjacent to the Community Centre. The Trust has also decided to seek to carry forward the former West Bay Steering Committee's plans for the revitalisation of the West Bay area, though a lot of work remains to be done on this.

Ferry Birds - Oct 2011 to Jan 2012 by John Done

The recent weather has been so different from last year and the bird sightings I have had have reflected this. Although we have had some frosty nights we have only had a couple of light snow falls and the birds from inland have not had to come to the coast for food and some shelter. **mute swans**, but then heard them. The names for these 2 types of swan are apt. The **mute swan**, apart from some hissing to frighten people and other birds is essentially mute. The **whoopers** are very noisy and their calls are well described as whooping. The birds I saw gave themselves away! The

West Bay has, as usual, been the busiest for bird life. There have been up to 40 **redshanks** in the bay feeding on the mud most obviously before and after high tide. There are also **oystercatchers** and a few **curlews** scattered around the bay and they have been joined by up to 4 **dunlins** and **turnstones**. At high tide the **redshanks** often roost on the floating mooring in the bay and that is where I have normally seen the **dunlins** and **turnstones**. As some of you will have noticed we have a pair of **shelducks** in the bay this winter. Two more have joined them occasionally and there were also 2 **mute swans** there on the 3rd of December.

The resident **eider** ducks have been joined on the sea by reasonable numbers of **red-breasted mer-gansers**, **goldeneyes** and **little** and **great crestedgrebes**. The **mergansers** and **goldeneyes** tend to be offshore from the coastal path from Port Laing to Cruickness Point while the **little grebes** stay close to the coast along the same stretch. I counted 14 **goldeneyes** and about the same number of **mergansers** there on the 14th of January. The males of both species were in full breeding plumage and they are starting to show off to the females so that they can sort out who's with whom for the coming breeding season.

Unlike last year I have seen a few **red-throated divers** over the last few months. There was 1 at Port Laing on the 28th of October and probably 2 there on the 26th of November. The only other sea birds of note have been a few **kittiwakes** at the end of October and an immature one on the 3rd of November. **Kittiwakes** breed at several places in the Forth Estuary and normally winter far out to sea.

I have several reports and sightings of unusual or difficult to see species. I saw a **kingfisher** in Inverkeithing Inner Bay by the scrap yard loading jetty on the 29th of October and one was reported in West Bay at the end of November. **Tawny owls** have been heard calling near Garthhill in January and I heard them near The Brae on the 19th and 23rd of November and earlier near the station on the16th. Autumn is a good time to see **goldcrests** and true to form my only recent sightings were of 1 near Jamestown on the 10th of October and 2 at Carlingnose on the 15th. A very surprising sighting on the 3rd of January was of 6 **whooper swans** flying over Inverkeithing Inner Bay. I first thought they were

these 2 types of swan are apt. The **mute swan**, apart from some hissing to frighten people and other birds is essentially mute. The whoopers are very noisy and their calls are well described as whooping. The birds I saw gave themselves away! The whooper swans in Scotland in winter are real wild swans which breed in Iceland. Using Satellite tracking a bird was found in the Outer Hebrides the day after it had been located in Iceland. The minimum distance covered was 800 km! The RSPB reserve at Vane Farm on Loch Leven is a favoured wintering spot with over 100 of them there at the moment. A great spotted woodpecker has been seen near Garthhill and one flew over the road near there as I walked towards Jamestown on the 14th of January. I heard a racket on The Brae on the 15th of December and looked up as 2 peregrines squabbled over a smaller bird. It was probably a redshank which was let go during the altercation and disappeared leaving the peregrines to settle their differences and remain hungry.

Redwings and fieldfares are usually guite common visitors to the area in autumn and winter, but there have not been many about recently. They belong to the thrush family which includes blackbirds, song thrushes and mistle thrushes. Walking the coastal path in autumn usually disturbs far more blackbirds than could be from the local population. The extra ones are probably from Scandinavia and have arrived with the redwings and fieldfares seeking food and relative warmth. I have seen a few small flocks of fieldfares during my wanderings around Fife but the only redwing I have seen in North Queensferry was one having a bathe in a puddle on the coastal path in the nature reserve on the 9th of November. There was quite a party going on with several **blackbirds**, a robin, dunnock and a few blue tits sharing the pool. A mistle thrush was perched on the high point of the reserve, but didn't join in.

The ducks displaying are a sign of spring and the **song thrushes** are also starting to sing. The first I heard was on the 24th of November with several more noted around the turn of the year. Another sign is the return of the **fulmars** to inspect their nesting areas on Inchgarvie. The first time I saw them was while on the Bird Walk on the 14th of January. We were a small select group and had a good walk round West Bay then along the coastal path to Port Laing. The tide was far out, but we spotted the waders from the play area at Pier Head, had a brief view of a **sparrowhawk** flying across the bay and then admired the male **eider** from the coastal path near the derelict pier.

More than 200 tickets at £1 each have already been sold to Rotary Club members and friends but tickets can also be bought at the door on the day. As well as the usual coffee, biscuits and scones there will be a sale of cakes, books, guality household goods and white elephant. In addition, raffle and tombola tickets will be on sale throughout the morning, with the raffle being drawn around 12 noon. The event starts at 10.00 but donations of books and white elephant goods will be accepted in the Church Hall from 09.30 on 18 February.

The Club's annual Burns Supper was held in the Queensferry Lodge Hotel on Friday 27 January with Club members taking on the task of proposing the various toasts and providing the entertainment. An excellent evening celebrating the anniversary of our National Poet. The Club's Grand Raffle, which raised almost £2,000 was also drawn on the night.

Future school events supported by the Rotary Club will include the, by now, well established Primary School Quiz, the Young Chef Competition and the Inverkeithing High School music evening on 27 March. The Club will shortly be asking for applications for the 2 places on its Rotary Youth Leadership week at Nethybridge in Speyside. This week long course in July offers students the opportunity to try a wide range of challenging outdoor activities under the guidance of experienced leaders. Students attend from many parts of Scotland so there are good opportunities to develop new friendships. In addition to the outdoor challenges participants can take part in team building and leadership activities. Participants on previous courses have found the experience rewarding – and great fun! The Club continues to meet in the Queensferry Hotel on Wednesdays at 12.30 when lunch is usually followed by a speaker from local organisations or businesses. Anyone interested in coming along to a Rotary Club meeting, or who would like more

Hohoe Twinning Update.

Two from NQ head for Hohoe in Ghana.

Following on from the visit last year of the Rev Dr Solomon Sula-Saa from Ghana, the twinning committee decided at their November meeting to investigate the possibility of sending two of its members to Hohoe in Ghana. The purpose of the visit would be to strengthen existing contacts with the church, community and school, build on our relationship, learn more of their culture and establish a twinning agreement.

With this in mind an application was sent to The Church of Scotland World Mission Committee to help and support us with our plans. Our application was delivered just in time for their November meeting and in December we were informed that our application had been successful and that we would receive financial support for flights, visas and insurance for two people to go to Hohoe.

At an earlier meeting Jan and I had indicated that we would be prepared to go to Hohoe if and when the opportunity arose and the time was right.

Now this is a reality. We fly to Accra, the capital of Ghana, on 15^{th} Feb 2012 for a 15 day stay in the village of Hohoe.

Since December the preparations have been hectic, collecting gifts and artefacts which depict our life here in North Queensferry and Scotland.

Our Sunday Funday children are busy making a banner which we will present to the Sunday school in Hohoe.

North Queensferry PS is undertaking a whole school project on Africa this year and is keen to establish links with the school in Hohoe. We plan to take letters from our pupils, to the pupils in Hohoe, explaining what life is like in North Queensferry and we hope they will write back to explain what life is like there. In addition our pupils will be designing individual bookmarks which we will take as gifts from the children of NQPS to the children of Hohoe School.

The preparations continue - watch this space.....

The primary aims of our constitution gives the trust a wide remit to care for the beauty, history and character of North Queensferry and surrounding area.
