Ferry Birds - Oct 2012 to Jan 2013

West Bay and Port Laing have been the focus for bird activity in the last few months. The bar-tailed godwits I mentioned last time disappeared at the end of September, but there has been a single one in the bay off and on since then. Up to six dunlins were in West Bay at the beginning of December along with the usual redshanks and ovstercatchers. Two or three curlews have also been feeding regularly in the bay. At the same time a grey heron and the occasional mute swan has been seen, but the stars of the period have been the **shelducks**. The most I have seen was eight at the beginning of January. They are resplendent in their new plumage having been away for a several weeks in autumn at their moulting grounds. The male eiders which occasionally come into the bay are also looking immaculate, hoping to attract a female so that they can get down to the serious business of raising young in the spring. Other visitors to West Bay in the last few months have included 4 mallards (2 males and 2 females) present for several weeks in November and December and a male wigeon on the 17th of October. Six **goosanders** were also in the Bay a day earlier. This was probably a family group as they were all in juvenile or female plumage.

Port Laing is where the red-breasted mergansers and goldeneyes congregate. These birds breed further north in Scotland and spend the winter around the coast of the Firth of Forth. The males are vying with each other to attract the females and the mergansers also seem to practice synchronised diving just offshore from Port Laing. When strong westerlies are blowing these ducks get shelter here along with hundreds of black-headed and herring gulls. These birds are joined by a few little grebes which keep quite close to the shore and this winter there have been joined by up to twelve great-crested grebes. Both grebes breed locally on fresh water so will soon disappear although if we get a cold spell of weather and the inland waters freeze they may delay their departure. I had several sightings of **red-throated divers** last autumn. They were off Port Laing on the 9th of October and again on the 1st of November. A more uncommon visitor was a black-throated diver which I saw off Port Laing on the 3rd of January and again off the Town Pier on the 11th. That day was also when I saw the first fulmars flying around Inchgarvie. Having spent two or three months out in the North Sea the fulmars seem to come back

to their nesting cliffs at this time of year apparently to check up that the cliffs are still there. They stay around for a few days and then disappear only to come back again a week or so later to make sure!

The return of the **fulmars** is the first sign that the breeding season will soon be here. Other signs are the **robins** singing their plaintive songs, often by lamp-light, and the **song thrush** I heard singing near Jamestown on the 3rd of January. Having said last time that I hadn't seen a **song thrush** around the village for some time one was seen at a bird feeder in the lower village at the end of December and I have seen or heard them in the village or from the coastal path near Kinghorn several times recently.

Other interesting sightings I have had include a male **yellowhammer** in the scrub near the Jamestown pond, a peregrine falcon over the quarry and a male blackcap in the tree near Willie's Well. Blackcaps normally winter in Africa, but a few are now seen every winter in Scotland. They have been seen in the village over the last few winters and I have seen reports of them recently in Edinburgh and East Lothian. A kingfisher was also seen near Pierhead Buildings in the autumn. Having been told of some tree sparrows visiting a garden birdfeeder near the school I was lucky enough to see 4 in one of the small trees along Ferryhills Road on the 2nd of December. My luck was really in that day because I saw the green woodpecker near the Jamestown pond about half an hour later. Again it was feeding on the ground and, as I approached, it flew off showing its characteristic yellow rump.

We had great weather for the Nature walk on the 12th of January. We timed it well as there were about 20 **redshanks** and a single **dunlin** on the tide line at the mouth of West Bay. A **curlew** was patrolling on the mud in the middle of the bay and a few **oystercatchers** were busily trying to dislodge limpets or other shellfish from the rocks by the play area at Pierhead. The highlight of the walk along the coastal path was a distant view of a **Grey Seal** on one of the marker buoys across the estuary towards Hound Point.

The maintenance of the Carlingnose Reserve was done in two phases this year. The grass was cut in November and then some of the gorse, dog rose, hawthorn and cotoneaster at the edges of the grassland were cut in December. This is all part of the plan to maintain and where possible increase the area of grassland so that the rare plants have as much room as possible to grow and thrive.

Happy New Year from your Community Council

Well, once again, it's been a particularly busy (and quick) year for the Community Council. We have been short of Councillors for most of the year, which has resulted in a few meetings being cancelled and unfortunately we've let a few things slip. One noticeable absence has been the posting of minutes, for which we can only apologise. Fortunately, Brian Armstrong has offered to take this on (as a member of the public) and Jim George has re-joined as a Councillor, this should take some of the pressure off, however, we still have vacancies and would love to hear from anyone who might be interested.

You may have noticed that the village is starting to look a little dilapidated, we certainly have - it had been at least 18 months since the verges were last cut. We recently spent a couple of hours with lan Jones, from Fife Council, walking around the village and identifying issues where action could be taken. This was a mixed bag, from potholes and overgrown footpaths, to speeding and antisocial behaviour. He made a list of 32 issues to pass on to the relevant section heads. There are obviously budgetary constraints to contend with; however, I'm pleased to note that some have already been actioned and both Fife Constabulary and Fife Council have agreed to take action with regards to speeding on Ferryhills Road.

One noticeable success, has been the agreement to put night gates on Battery Road car park, the scene of antisocial behaviour predating most of the current Councillors. This has come about due to the constant campaigning of the residents of Battery Road and should also bring some relief to those residents of Pierhead and Main St. We have spent almost two years negotiating with Network Rail and Fife Council to take responsibility for the car park and return it to its former condition. Hopefully once

the barrier is erected in the spring, the car park will remain in excellent order and be used for the originally intended purpose. Unfortunately, our efforts to secure the return of the Picnic area and access to the East Battery foreshore have not been so successful, Network Rail digging in their heels and remaining both physically and literally obstructive. We will continue addressing these issues as one of our top priorities for the coming year.

As you may have recently read in the Press, Cruicks Quarry has been granted planning permission for a further extraction period of up to 20 years. This was a disappointment, the quarry is currently mothballed and the community council see this as a simply pushing the restoration and remediation date further into the future. However, with the help of Councillors Chapman and Shirkie, the applicants have been bound to consult with the local communities properly and enter into talks over a communities' fund being set up.

We had really hoped to re-light the North Queensferry Christmas tree at the War Memorial this year, something that's been missing for a lot of years, but unfortunately our plans were scuppered at the last minute by a dodgy electrical connection (and not having £2k for a new one!) Still, it puts us well ahead of the game for next year. Our plan is to start with the tree, then move on to the ten lamp posts between the bottom of the Brae and Pierhead and finally the trees outside the station on Brock St. Obviously this will take a bit of funding. Each post is approximately £250 for the supply and £250 for the lights, so we're open to suggestions (and wealthy benefactors.)

This is only a fraction of what we've been up to, I could go on forever (but I won't,) we'd love to hear from more members of the community, so please get in touch and all the best for healthy, happy and prosperous 2013.

Christmas East Delhi style

I have read all the village festive notices on the web and my diary says it is 25 December... so it must be Christmas!

There is a fierce biting wind from the Himalayas....it is 20 degrees but feels like North Queensferry in January. I walk to work along the dual carriageway: past three sets of traffic lights, past oxen waiting to be hitched to their carts...but no stable and manger in sight. I wish the roaming family of pigs best wishes for the festive season and say my usual one hundred 'Good mornings' starting with the gate keeper and finishing with the night guard at Manovikas where I'm working. He is always pleased to see me as seeing me means he can go home. It is eight o'clock and most of the staff will not appear before 10am. He spends the night sitting on a plastic chair on the pavement facing the building... not my idea of fun.

This is East Delhi...not the sophisticated South Delhi with its posh malls, Marks and Spencer, Early Learning and Mothercare but a down at heel community with small markets and barrows selling wonderful fruit and vegetables. Guavas are in season at present but unfortunately Mango are not. I stop to wish the fruit barrow boy 'Happy Christmas' and continue down the dusty road greeting usual men huddled over a sort of brazier making tea. I chat to a road sweeper who brushes the leaves and rubbish into neat piles ready for a Delhi municipal van to collect. Yet again I remind myself....it is Christmas Day. Maybe there are slightly less cars and cycle rickshaws on the road...but really it is hard to notice any difference from yesterday or the day before. Delhi has many many public holidays celebrating festivals from at least all the main religions including Hindu, Islam, Buddhist and Christian and Sikh. It seems that like the local children are never at school...something the children welcome but the parents don't. I continue walking following a yellow flowering hedge bordering the road. Three small thin men in drab worn clothes, brown/grey woollen hats and sacking shawls, cycle pass me on rickety bikes riding abreast, deep in conversation, all pulling small wooden carts with grey plastic sacs...off to scavenge people's rubbish put out for the 'official' bin man. They are followed, almost immediately by three well built arrogant teenage school boys in smart maroon blazers and grey trousers.... also three a breast, also in deep conversation but in all other respects so very different. The caste system is still much in evidence here.

This part of Delhi does not see tourists. In fact I only meet/see local Indians. People know about Christmas but there are not any decorations, lights, Christmas trees, in fact absolutely none of the frantic consumer bonanza experienced in the UK. Now

Divali was something totally different: lots of houses decorated with lights and the fireworks from across all of Delhi sounding like a continuous loud clap of thunder. Households decorated their rooftops with candles and I did the same, since I live in a 'barsatis' (a wee hoose/one room, on a rooftop). All Delhi flats are not allowed to be higher than four stories which means I have good views across of the city and soaring black kites, buzzards and eagles.

I stop at a stall and buy some candles to put around my roof top for Christmas.

Yes, the candles went around my roof top on Christmas night. Now more are lit each night in memory of the twenty three year old girl who died from injuries caused when she was gang raped. You have probably heard about it on the news ...it has caused mass demonstrations in Delhi and other Indian cities. The Government is now looking at the rape law (someone is raped in Delhi every 14 hours). This might help but there needs to be a change in society's attitude to women before there are any real improvements in women's safety in India.

The Trust starts 2013 with good news stories of further potential developments that will benefit our area and also takes this opportunity of wishing all members and readers a very happy New Year.

A Treasurer is being sought following the resignation of our new Treasurer due to other commitments. The position is voluntary and includes attending monthly meetings, the processing of receipts & payments, maintaining financial & PAYE records and submitting annual Inland Revenue and OSCR returns. The 25th anniversary since the formation of the Trust in 1988 occurs this year and the committee have been debating on a suitable event to celebrate the occasion. On the 25th May in the Community Centre it is our intention to host an exhibition celebrating the achievements of the Trust over the past 25 years. As an integral part of the celebration the Trust would like to invite all artists in the North Queensferry area to exhibit paintings and craft items which could be offered for sale. Anyone who wishes to enter an exhibit(s) or organise a stand will be most welcome and is asked to notify our secretary at ngheritagetrust@gmail.com with their intention.

The Trust's archive now has a complete record of all published North Queensferry census records from 1841 to 1911 which shows the huge influx of people to the area during the construction of the Forth Bridge and the development of the Rosyth Naval base prior to the First World War Full details in easy to read and identify names format are available on the Trust's CD.

The photographic archive continues to expand and now has well over 1,000 photographs from the 19th century up to today. Volume 3 of our CD series is now in course of preparation.

Ferryhills Heritage Trail is another project that is continuing to be planned between the Trust and the land owners Tarmac.

Phase 1 is to display information boards in the area leading up to the water tower describing the key points of interest over the centuries. These include the Battle of Inverkeithing, the Industrial Development and the former Ferryhills Golf Club and its prominence during WW1.

Phase 2 is a possible link up with the existing pathway from the end of the Forth Road Bridge to the Community Centre, on to the Ferry Loch and the difficult project of safely crossing the railway cutting.

The light tower will again be open during the summer season but we are hoping that with your help it will be possible to keep the tower and

exhibition on the 'Ferries' open for a longer number of hours. We continue to open the tower and exhibition 'free of charge' except for lighting the lamp but do rely on donations to cover all the costs. The day Rebus was beaten 'Black and Blue' in the Ferry

On a wild and windy Sunday in November 1999, Craigdhu Cottage was the scene of a brutal murder...

And as we prepare to put the 'for sale ' board up and leave North Queensferry after almost twenty years, we thought we would share our memories of the day Rebus was beaten up in our garden.

If you don't know Craigdhu Cottage, it sits on the water's edge, up a tree-lined driveway near the Road Bridge, with access to private wooded grounds and coastal rocks. The estate agent's favourite clichéd phrase 'an idyllic hideaway location' could have been penned with Craigdhu Cott-tage in mind.

So what was Rebus doing in North Queensferry? (as far as we know he wasn't swapping the Oxford Bar for the Albert.)

Apparently the location scouts for the company filming Rebus for STV had been flying over likely locations and had spotted a property which looked ideal for some scenes in their adaptation of Ian Rankin's novel 'Black and Blue'. The company then posted a letter through our mailbox asking if they could use Craigdhu Cottage as a film location.

What followed was a fascinating insight into the filming process.

On the day of filming, a crew of around 70 people, garden.

including two 'stunt cats' (our own moggies didn't have the necessary credentials) descended on our house and garden. Howling gales and torrential rain added authenticity to the menacing story line – poor John Hannah looked cold, wet and muddy as he was pursued and beaten up in the grounds.

Our elder daughter at the time was 'social editor' of the school magazine and the leading man generously agreed to her cheeky request for an interview.

Meanwhile, the 'chuck wagon' set up in the field next door produced a full Sunday dinner for film crew and family.

Between takes, the 'murderer' (well known as the actor who plays Bishop Brenan in Father Ted) chatted and joked with our children. One moment the chilling and evil eyed 'Bible John' character and the next, affable, charming and avuncular.

When the film was screened in the spring of 2000 it was fascinating to see our house transformed by the skill of the production team into a film set.

There was our kitchen, our tea-towel, our saucepan - and then the camera panned to a naked body sprawled across our dining room floor....(not the lovely Mr Hannah in case you're wondering....)

There's no 'blue plaque' above the door yet, but one day, maybeafter all, not every property in the Ferry can claim the dubious honour of having Inspector Rebus beaten 'black and blue' in its garden.
