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Ferry Birds Oct 2013 to Jan 2014

West Bay has been the usual focus for waterside birds in the autumn and winter. The mainstays are the **redshanks** which number about 35. They are joined by a good number of **oystercatchers**, 2 or 3 **curlews** and there has also been a single **dunlin** and a few **turnstones** feeding amongst the seaweed in the bay. The most obvious birds in the bay are, however, the **shelducks**. There have been up to 11 feeding in the bay and sitting on the floating mooring as the tide covers the mud. As last year there have been several **mallards** with the **shelducks**. There are also **black-headed** and **herring gulls** as well as the occasional **common gull** which, as avid readers of these articles will remember, are not that common.

Port Laing is where the red-breasted mergansers The number of and **goldeneyes** congregate. mergansers peaked in November when I counted 71 on the 15th, but they seem to have disappeared by early January and been replaced by between 10 and 20 goldeneves. Both these species breed in Scotland although there are only a few pairs of the latter in the Spey valley. These ducks have been joined by a few little grebes and up to 11 greatcrested grebes and I have also seen a red-throated **diver** on 2 occasions, the last being the 3rd January. I have had a fair number of sightings of the less common birds around the village. I saw a raven over Carlingnose reserve on the 13th of December and one over the railway station on the 3rd of January. A mistle thrush was calling near the school on the 26th of November. I also heard and saw a small flock of redwing flying over The Brae on the 19th of October. The **redwings** come to Scotland in the winter to avoid the cold weather in Scandinavia, but the numbers that appear here vary greatly being dependent on the severity of the weather. Another visitor from Scandinavia in the winter is the smallest European bird the goldcrest. They join our resident goldcrests and I have seen or heard them in several places along the coastal path. This bird weighs between 5 and 7

grams so you would get 4 or 5 to the ounce. Imagine this tiny animal flying across the North Sea! It must be wind-assisted, but even so an amazing journey. I have just read that a goldcrest which was ringed at Fife Ness in October 1988 was found in Finland in September 1989 so this bird had probably done the journey twice. Collared doves were common in the village several years ago, but seem to have disappeared so one near the station on the 18th of December was a good sighting. Let's hope they come back and breed. Other less common birds have been a grey wagtail feeding on the grassy patch half way up The Brae on the 11th of January and probably the same one on the rocks near the play area at Pierhead Buildings on the 13th.

Several people have asked me about numbers of common birds such as house sparrows and starlings. I think that the house sparrows are doing quite well, but they seem to have quite specific areas where they feed and roost. These include the bushes around the station, the beech hedges in Carlingnose Way and the ivy at St James' Chapel. Walking past any of these spots you will hear the almost continual chatter which will stop abruptly as you get too close. Starlings have on the other hand declined significantly in the village. I remember very noisy summer groups of adults and young in many of the open areas in the village and on the power cables on Ferryhills. The numbers of these groups and the numbers in them have definitely declined. During my walks near Kinghorn, however, I often see up to 150 starlings by the path up to the loch. Bird populations fluctuate guite widely depending on the weather when the young birds fledge, the availability of food at crucial times and, of course the winter weather when they are at their most vulnerable. It is the long term trend in numbers which is important and nationally it does appear that both these species are, indeed, declining.

One of our resident birds is anticipating the coming of spring. Recently a **song thrush** has been

my garden on the 13th January busily searching the leaf litter for juicy invertebrates. Other resident birds such as robins, blackbirds and blue and great tits are also advertising their presence by calling from the bushes and trees around the village.

After failing to appear for the Bird Walk on the 11th January fulmars were back in force on Inchgarvie on the 14th.

The maintenance of the Carlingnose Reserve was done in two phases this year. The grass was cut in November and then some of the gorse, dog rose,

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Heritage Trust

As the prospect of World Heritage Status for the Forth Bridge draws closer, the Trust is organising a series of events that much reflect the heritage values of this area.

We started the year off with a nature walk with our local bird expert John Done. We wandered down to the Bay, listening to robins and watching the birdlife. We then wandered up to Carlingnose Reserve, with a stop at some of the heritage sites en route.

We are delighted that our speaker event in **March** will be author and local historian Hugh Walker. He will be talking about the long tradition of linen and silk in Dunfermline. In **April** we will hear from the Scottish Wildlife Trust about their reserves in Fife and the Jupiter project in Grangemouth. We then have another nature walk with John in **May** and will add in a few more heritage sites to the route.

We have begun to research the idea of developing a new local history project. We have been offered some help in training for recording oral history by staff at the new Dunfermline Museum (due to open in 2016). The new museum staff are working on two projects at the moment and have put a call out to the village for help over the next two years.

The first project is called **"Where were you the day the Forth Bridge opened"** and museum staff are really excited at the possibility of involving North Queensferry. They are also starting a project on stories of both world wars.

In response to concerns that were raised at the November Community Engagement Meeting, Inverkeithing and North Queensferry Community Officers initially focussed on reducing anti-social behaviour within Inverkeithing Town Centre and Ballast Bank area.

Community teams have also worked in cooperation with Roads Policing units in an attempt to deter people from committing the types of road traffic offences that are usually associated with the Festive Period.

As a result of the action taken, a number of offences have been detected throughout Inverkeithing and North Queensferry, and there has been a marked decrease in the number of calls from the public regarding anti social behaviour during November and December. The next Police Community Engagement Meeting for Inverkeithing and North Queensferry is due to be held at Inverkeithing High School, on Thursday the 6th of March 2014. Any members of the public who wish to raise their concerns relating to Inverkeithing and North Queensferry are welcome to attend.

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Boat Club

There have been rumours circulating lately about the future of the old railway pier; as chairman of the Boat Club I feel it might be helpful to let you know our views on the proposal put forward by the North Queensferry Community Trust at its AGM in December. The Trust wish to decimate the ground area occupied by the Boat Club to approximately one fifth of its current size; despite us being the only paying occupants for this area and also to increase our fees substantially. As we have maintained the area on behalf of the council for 20 years we are worried there may not be adequate maintenance of the pier which might fall into disrepair and become dangerous.

The Trust want to develop a multi-use building on the pier for social and corporate events and also encourage unsupervised barbecues which could be a fire risk especially if unsupervised alcohol is involved.


There is also an expression of intent to bring cruise ship passengers into the village (which might involve as many as 3,000 people at a time) into an infrastructure not designed to deal with them. Full details are available to read at the boat club members' portacabin. The Boat Club have been relatively low profile in the village but have always supported any local group requiring assistance or financial support. Last year we had a stall at the gala. We have in the past provided funding for and built 2 rowing skiffs for the local rowing community. We have also supported Fife Sailability in preparing a boat for use with the disabled, this year we hope to liaise with the RYA Sailability section to organise boating facilities for the disabled.

We are proud of our green credentials and hope this year to make wild flower plantings to encourage the area's SSI standing and increase the wildlife on and around the pier.

As a club (we are now one of the largest on the river) which will be celebrating its 60th year of existence this year it is sad to find it so threatened that it may have to leave the area.

We have a long-standing relationship with our neighbours and local dog walkers and make our toilet facilities available to members of the public since the council demolished the local toilets without supplying an alternative at the pier.
