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Ferry Birds - Sept 2018

The common birds in and around the village seemed to have done quite well this year. **Eider** ducks were showing off their broods in West Bay. I noted groups of about 20 young with a few females there on the 6th and 14th of July. The coastal path was the best place to learn the songs of our resident birds and summer visitors with the highlight being a **lesser whitethroat** at Carlingnose on the 1st of July.

As residents of the lower village will know there were lots of terns in and around West Bay this summer. The noise was continuous and very loud. There were both common and Sandwich terns present but I have been told that those on Long Craig did not breed very successfully. Apparently workers on the Road Bridge made noises which frightened the birds which left their nests leaving their eggs and chicks vulnerable to predation by gulls. Those nesting on the dolphins were not so badly affected probably because they were further away from the bridge.

After a quiet spell in June and early July I then had some good sightings (or hearings). A few **redshanks** were back in West Bay at the beginning of July but it got more interesting later that month with a whimbrel flying over the station on the 16th with another over The Brae in late August. There were a few turnstone in West Bay on the 9th and 20th of that month as well. In late September 2 blacktailed godwit were feeding with the redshank and curlew in West Bay. These birds are intermediate in size redshank and curlew. between They have long straight bills and are mainly autumn and winter visitors to

the muddy shore line of the Firth of Forth. Other sightings include a **peregrine falcon** calling above The Brae on the 26th of September with another or the same the following day and a **raven** near the rail bridge on the 4th of October. Both these species have bred in Cruicks Quarry, but I didn't see any breeding activity this year.

After a bonanza last year very few field gentians flowered on Carlingnose Point reserve this year. A few were found in the ground around the rocky knoll. **Dropwort** appeared again in the watertank field and was also found on the reserve on the steep bank above Carlingnose View. There were a few plants near the rocky knoll at Carlingnose as well. The annual cutting of the grass on the reserve has already been done and gorse was painstakingly removed from one side of the rocky knoll. There is a possibility more maintenance will be carried out later in the year.

Finally why not take a walk round the lower village and keep your eyes and ears ready for some nature spotting. Time your walk to coincide with the tide starting to come into West Bay and count the redshanks feeding on the mud. I counted at least 35 recently. They were accompanied by 3 or 4 curlews and several oystercatchers and a few turnstones which feed on the rocky surrounds of the bay and the piers rather than the mud. Listen out for the pink-footed geese flying over after their journey from Iceland. Other winter visitors such as redwings and fieldfares should soon be here so check the rowans and cotoneaster shrubs while on the coastal path. Check the ivy for insects on a sunny day as well.

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Village Show 2018



Thank you to everyone: all the exhibitors, both young and old, and all the helpers whose tasks included moving tables, making teas, selling raffle tickets and baking cakes. So many people helped to make the annual Village Show a very enjoyable occasion. This year the Show was held at the Community Centre on Saturday 8 September. It was a great success. The large turnout may have stemmed from the lack of a Gala this year but a more likely reason was the opening of the Multi Use Games

Area (MUGA) on the same afternoon. This meant more families from outwith the village visited the Show when they came to watch their children play on the new MUGA pitches. The hungry young participants and their accompanying families resulted in the Show selling a record number of teas, cakes and juice.

The Village Show displayed the usual exhibits ranging from pot plants to potted jam and chutney – all from the village. The school's entered a particularly bright and cheerful selection of decorated jam jars along with many 'Scotland' posters showing great talent among the pupils.

The 2018 Show had a new section, 'professional photography', which exhibited some interesting large prints. This year also saw an enhanced local groups/activities section publicising such diverse local activities as rowing and the children's nursery. The Village Gala had a successful stand aimed at promoting/reviving North Queensferry's annual children's Gala and the Play Park Group's fundraising stand



painted many overjoyed faces while at the same time substantially adding to the total Village Show outcome. Proceeds from the Show are going towards refurbishing Pierhead Play Park.

This year, Fiona George, as overall winner, was awarded the Bob Cubin Cup and the Maureen Trotter Cup went to Richard Moore for his floral arrangement. Mckenzie Foreman received the Queen's Jubilee Cup as overall winner of the children's section.

Parking in Brock Street

There's a parking problem in Brock Street and it's not getting better. It has a number of causes and it'll require a number of solutions.

At the bottom end, we have rail commuters and school traffic. At the top, we have Community Centre and MUGA. A few thoughts on each of those.

Commuters are coming here in part because Inverkeithing is full. There, anyone who isn't up with the lark won't find a parking place within a sensible walking distance of the station, so some have worked out that parking in North Queensferry is worth missing out on the trains that don't stop here.

A lot of the school traffic is temporary, with kids being dropped off in the morning and picked up later in the day.

Both the Community Centre and the MUGA attract custom from outside the village. In particular, the Dog Training classes contribute significantly to the Centre's income.

So, what <u>could</u> be done. First and foremost, **IF YOU CAN WALK, THEN PLEASE DO WALK**. If you live in the village, you're fit and well and the weather isn't too grim, a walk up to the School or the Community Centre is a chance for some extra exercise.

Second, if you're dropping someone off, do you have to go to the Community Centre door? Could you drop them off on the other side of the playing field or even some way down Brock Street?

Thirdly, if you do need to park up at the Centre, please try to maximise the number of cars in the car park. It may be possible to get some white lines to mark parking bays but they're not there yet.

There's a Residents' Parking scheme in Inverkeithing but that's aimed at commuters by allowing anyone to park for three hours without a permit. There's talk from time to time of residents'-only parking restrictions but a few moments thought yields lots of complications.

What about home care workers, for example? Even at three hours, tradesmen can have problems.

There are patches of grass that could be (and perhaps already are in decent weather) used for parking. Subject to finding the money, those could be candidates for Grasscrete, the concrete honeycombs that let cars sit on what looks at first glance like straight grass.

In September the duties of all Fife community councillors came to an end with the expiry of the term of the old Community Council. In the succeeding elections there were fewer nominations than the number of places available, so those who had put their name forward were duly elected.

The new community council saw the return of all of your community councillors, with the exception of Peter Selbie who has retired. Thank you, Peter for all your good work with the council over the last four years.

Your community councillors are :- Donna Beveridge, Lin Collis, Bruce Finlayson, Mary Finlayson, Sheila Foggon, Jim George, Christina McKenzie, Iain Mitchell and David Shields.

The inaugural meeting of the new four year session of the community council took place on 11 October 2018, when lain Mitchell was elected as Chairman, Lin Collis as Vice-Chairman, David Shields as Secretary and Christina MacKenzie as Treasurer.

Following this meeting your community council continued its work on issues which have needed its attention over the last five months and longer. Transport, both air and road, continue as important, also frustrating, issues. Concerns about the new flight paths remain: there are now seven neighbouring community coun-

Road transport issues could be said to be inevitable in a small, village with a 'dead-end' road and next to a World Heritage site. Your council is working hard to ensure the appropriate bodies know of the worries and to follow up and push for action. Current road transport issues include: parking at the Pierhead turning circle and at the school, bus routes which do not take in Rosyth, the use of the Brae by unsuitably large/long vehicles as well as such vehicles being directed into the village by Sat. Nav., speeding (not sticking to the 20mph speed limit) throughout the village and dipping cobbles at the War Memorial in Main Road.

At a time of limited funding and action for change it is good to get some positive news: there is progress towards obtaining defibrillators for the village. The station defibrillator is in place with full instructions for its use on the case and planning permission has been applied for resuscitators at the Battery Road bus stop and the marina. Please keep an eye out for information about training courses in the near future.

Finally your council has and will continue with its usual responsibilities of assessing planning applications, reporting and monitoring village snags, such as the corroded traffic pole opposite the Albert and the hole in the sea wall in Battery Road, working with Fife Council and

Fife councillors to rationalise village grit bins, consider seagull proof bins in Battery Road, improving the steep slope between Mount Hooly Terrace and the Brae and tidying up the gravel area around St James Chapel.
