

Ferry Birds Autumn 2021

The village has been quite quiet over the past few months but I have seen or heard plenty of species nevertheless. A quick trip to Carlingnose early in October illustrates this. Fortunately the seat was vacant and several cormorants and guiliemots were spotted on the sea along with some gulls and an immature gannet. A common tern also flew by. Other birds heard included a chaffinch. small flock of long-tailed tits and a greenfinch. Back in the village The Brae was reasonably busy with a noisy pair of magpies and a crow along with a noisy flock of house sparrows. Meanwhile the usual waders were busy feeding on the mud in West Bay. The oystercatchers and curlews give themselves

away as they noisily decide who feeds where and the slightly quieter redshank get on with feeding up to regain their weight following their flights from Icelandic breeding sites. Another reminder of this migratory behaviour was the sound of geese over the village early in October. Other birds I have noted around the village have included blue great tits. blackand birds, robins and wood pigeons.

This time of year also produces the amazing display of flowers and fruits of the ivy. This never seems to fail with the ivy producing a continuous supply of flowers which in turn produce seeds and in the process supply food for insects such as hover-flies, bees and wasps. Take care, but choose a warm afternoon and go and marvel at a wonder of nature.

Community Council

Zoom, zoom, the year is rapidly passing and your Community Council is still using Zoom in place of actual face to face meetings. Depending on the decision at the Council meeting on Thursday (14.10.21) your zooming council may well not have face to face meetings using the Community Centre until next year. At least Zoom meetings mean we don't have to go out in the dark and cold! In fact these online meetings have proved very successful with many more village residents attending and putting their opinions forward. It appears that Zoom enables the voices of a lot more residents to be heard at Community Council meetings. If you would like to join a meeting please contact one of your community councillors for a Zoom link. The meetings are always the second Thursday of the month at 7.30pm.

Looking back at the last Ferry News Community Council article - in May most of our activities are long standing except that in the last few months we have been involved in the beginnings of a Local Plan for the village. All residents have had the opportunity to complete questionnaires and the results informed two village workshops held in the Community Centre and Deep Sea World in early August. The village seems to be in agreement that traffic and parking are two critical issues although by no means the only concerns. Although the Plan is being administered by Fife Council's Community Education Department it must be stressed that this Plan will be 'for the village by the village'.

As in previous articles about the Community Council certain vital topics continue to dominate our activities namely the Albert and its future, work on the Forth Bridge, a public toilet for the village, COVID relief and unsociable be-

haviour at Pierhead.

Stalemate seems to be the situation of the Albert as the current owner has withdrawn an application to Fife Council for planning permission to change the use of the Hotel into residential flats. Meanwhile the Albert building looks more and more sad as each week passes. The state of the Albert combined with the condition of the Ferrybridge hotel does nothing to provide a positive impression of the village to tourists and locals alike.

Work on the Forth Rail Bridge has continued throughout the summer and at the moment appears to be on schedule, thanks to the good summer weather we have enjoyed. This essential work, undertaken by Balfour Beatty for Network Rail, remains noisy and sometimes dusty however blasting is expected to finish at the end of December and the entire scaffold removed over the following months. Obviously this depends entirely on the weather and also the state of the steel and past repairs uncovered by the blasting. Weekly updates about the work and expected noise are posted on the three village notice boards as well as Network Rail's notice board in Battery Road Car Park. Two of your community councillors have weekly meetings with Network Rail and Balfour Beatty to raise village concerns, understand the works in progress, ask for reports and attempt to ameliorate difficulties. These meetings sometimes involve another department working on the coastal path which unfortunately still remains closed from the Brae to just past Piggery Steps. Additional to the work necessary to make various rocks safe Network Rail will also be taking down one tree and lopping the tops of others to improve safety at the Piggery

Steps. Meanwhile access to the Coastal Path is via Helen Lane and up a small track along the side the water treatment works.

If there is something you would like us to mention at the Network Rail, Balfour Beatty weekly meeting, please contact the Community Council Secretary:

One issue which is very long standing is the provision of a public toilet for the village. What is there to say? We are still waiting as the project crawls through the Fife Council system (cistern?)

The monthly agenda of your Community Council meeting has certain topics which always occur. These include village planning applications received by Fife Council; a Police report; reports from our four local Fife Councillors who regularly take forward our questions and concerns to Fife Council officers; a Floral Enhancement report detailing their flourishing gardening activities which we all must have noticed around the village and information on Edinburgh Airport's plans for changing their

flight paths.

The police monthly reports record any crime in the village and also the number of North Queensferry phone calls made to the Police. Although the Police try to have a presence in the village often they are only able to act when contacted by the public as they are much overstretched and have minimal staff .The Police receive, on average, ten phone calls a month from the village which is very few compared to other areas in South West Fife, so obviously the latter receive priority. Antisocial behaviour of 'visitors' to North Queensferry has plagued the village for years however to obtain Police support to help solve this unsociable matter it is imperative that we phone 101 when the problem occurs.

The Community Council continues to administer a small fund for COVID relief to support local residents. This fund will probably be wound up at the end of this year unless the situation with COVID changes. Grants are completely confidential. To apply: please contact 07973 839751

Local Action Plan (NQLAP)

The North Queensferry Local Action Plan is an inclusive area wide community consultation, using the place standards framework to guide the community consultation process. Fife Council Community Learning and Development staff along with colleagues in Housing Services, Safer Neighbourhoods team and The North Queensferry Local Action Plan steering group reps, posted questionnaires through every door in North Queensferry. This also included having a chat with residents to assist them fill in the questionnaires and how it was important for every resident to have their say on The Local Action Plan.

504 questionnaires were delivered in North Queensferry, with completed questionnaires to be returned to either Wrights Shop or Rankin's Café.

There was a 20% return of questionnaires, along with information sent directly by voluntary and community groups in North Queensferry.

Added to this was an online consultation with P1-P7 pupils from North Queensferry Primary School. We also had a Zoom call with local businesses in North Queensferry.

The Community Consultation process has had to, like all things in everyday life, contend with the Covid-19 global pandemic. At all times Fife Council staff and steering group members followed the Scottish Governments guidance and protocols throughout.

In September we got the green light to hold 'Vision into Reality' and 'Making It Happen' workshops in the North Queensferry Community Centre and Deep-Sea World café area. This gave us venues at the top and bottom of the village to encourage maximum participation in the workshops from residents.

The workshops took place on Wednesday the 8th and 15th of September from 3-5 pm in the Community Centre and from 6-8 pm in Deep Sea World café.

At the workshops all the information from

the completed paper questionnaires, online questionnaires, consultations with school pupils, businesses and information directly from voluntary and community groups, were on display in the workshops.

Participants in the workshops were guided round the information on display. Participants were encouraged to fill out forms that identified what outcomes from the questionnaires were a priority for them and to give an indication if they would like to be involved in finding resolutions to the outcomes in the Local Action Plan. Various Fife Council and partner agency staff attended the workshops to start discussions with participants on the outcomes from the consultation. This has already had positive impacts, with new cycle racks being installed around the village to encourage more green travel within the village.

All the information & feedback from the participants at the four workshops is being used to develop the local action plan. Community & Neighbourhoods Service staff are working with colleagues to write up the draft local action plan.

When the draft action plan is completed, staff will arrange community events, to ensure residents agree with the layout and format of the local action plan. The process will also include presenting the plan to the South & West Fife Area Committee, where the elected members will sign it off.

Fife Council Community & Neighbourhoods staff would like to acknowledge and thank, the Local Action Plan Steering Group, all community groups, businesses, school pupils, residents, Fife Council and partnership agencies, Wright's shop, Rankin's café, North Queensferry Community Centre and Deep-Sea World for all their help and support in developing the North Queensferry Local Action Plan. 
Village Show - Art Competition - 2021...
